EMERGENCY RULE

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds:

- That immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.
- That state or federal law or federal rule or a federal deadline for state receipt of federal funds requires immediate adoption of a rule.
- That in order to implement the requirements or reductions in appropriations enacted in any budget for fiscal years 2009, 2010, or 2011, which necessitates the need for the immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the fiscal needs or requirements of the agency.

Reasons for this finding: Based on historical catches and on-site inspection, the abundance of clams is adequate to support an eight-week season. Biotxin levels currently fall below the regulatory threshold. There is insufficient time to adopt permanent rules.

WAC 220-52-03000F Commercial Razor Clams

Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-52-030, effective 12:01 a.m. May 3, 2010, through 11:59 p.m. July 3, 2010, a person may dig for and possess razor clams for commercial purposes only in those waters and detached beaches of Razor Clam Area 1, lying south of the Willapa Bay Ship Channel, west of Ellen Sands and north of the tip of Leadbetter point; and in those waters and attached beaches north of the line of boundary markers consisting of four fluorescent orange posts near the northern tip of Leadbetter Point; all other areas remain closed.

REPEALER

The following section of the Washington Administrative Code is repealed effective 12:01 a.m. July 4, 2010:

WAC 220-52-03000F Commercial Razor Clams.
