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### **Background:**

Department staff will provide a brief overview to the Commission on proposed amendments and a proposed new section to the following WACs: 232-28-294 Multiple season big game permits; 232-28-291 Special hunting season permits; 232-12-055 Hunting – Hunter orange clothing requirements; and 232-12-062 Party hunting. This will include any changes resulting from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

Several changes are proposed for the special permit application system. The proposed changes were developed during the public comment period for the 2009-11 Hunting Season Package; however programming changes to the drawing system could not be completed in time for the 2009 drawing. Therefore, these recommended changes will be implemented for the 2010 drawing. The proposed changes have received support from the public as well as Game Management Advisory Council members. These changes will generate funding to expand the hunter access program into priority areas of the state.

The multiple season permit recommended amendments would change the process for purchasing permits to a first come first served system and would increase the number of deer permits from 1500 to 2000 and the number of elk permits from 500 to 600. Once the hunters are drawn, notifications would go out to a greater number of hunters than permits available. Those hunters notified would be allowed to purchase the multiple season permits on a first-come, first-served basis until the quota is reached.

Changes to the special permit rules are designed to accommodate the multiple season permit changes; reduce deer and elk permit group sizes; and clean up other areas consistent with the current permit drawings and proposed changes.

Changes to the hunter orange requirements are designed to clarify the seasons when hunters must wear orange clothing. The proposed party hunting rule is to define what is meant by party hunting; clarify that party hunting is illegal for big game and turkeys; and improve compliance with hunters who don't have a valid deer or elk tag, but wish to continue hunting other wildlife.

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### **Policy Issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:**

- Modify the permit application process to create additional permit categories and generate additional revenue.
  - Expand the number of multiple season permits and simplify the purchasing process.
  - Clarify hunter orange and party hunting regulations.
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**Public involvement process used and what you learned:**

The Department conducted an extensive public involvement process to develop these three-year hunting season cycle recommendations. In June 2008, the Department received nearly 4,000 responses to a scoping survey that was developed to determine the major issues that were important to the public. After the initial scoping phase, the issues were refined and preferred alternatives to address those issues were developed. The alternatives were discussed at more than ten public meetings held throughout the state in August and September. Nearly 5,000 people commented on the Alternatives, which were presented at the public meetings and available online for approximately seven weeks. In early January, an email was sent to over 50,000 hunters announcing that the proposed recommendations were online and would be available for comment until February 20. A postcard was mailed to approximately 800 organizations and individuals informing them of the opportunity to provide comments on the proposed regulations. Oral public testimony (if any was received) from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting is located at the end of this agenda item.

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**Action requested (identify the specific Commission decisions you are seeking):**

Amend WACs 232-28-294 Multiple season big game permits; 232-28-291 Special hunting season permits; 232-12-055 Hunting – Hunter orange clothing requirements; and adopt WAC 232-12-062 Party hunting, as presented.

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**Draft motion language:**

I move to amend WACs 232-28-294; 232-28-291; 232-12-055; and adopt WAC 232-12-062, as proposed.

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**Justification for Commission action:**

To clarify who needs to wear hunter orange during all seasons and types of permit hunts and what is meant by party hunting. In addition, this section will increase the number of multi season permits and hunter participation.

## WAC 232-12-055 Hunting – Hunter orange clothing requirements

### FINAL RECOMMENDED ADJUSTMENTS

The following adjustments are proposed since the Code Reviser (CR-102) filing and are already included in your notebook language. These adjustments reflect any floor changes and additional supplemental recommended adjustments as a result of public testimony received at the March 6-7, 2009 Fish and Wildlife Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

#### Page 15

Under section 2 change from:

(2) It is unlawful to hunt deer or elk during the modern firearm early and late general seasons in any manner unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.

To:

(2) It is unlawful to hunt deer or elk during ~~the~~ all modern firearm early and late general seasons in any manner unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.

This change is to clarify that all general seasons are affected. Some hunters may have been confused about the meaning of “early and late...”

**WAC 232-12-062 Party hunting**

**Page 19**

Change the WAC language from:

Party hunting is defined as killing big game or turkeys which another person tags, killing big game or turkeys with the intention of having another person tag the animal, or tagging a big game animal or turkey which another person has killed.

Party hunting is illegal for big game and turkey, except for hunters with disabilities and their designated hunting companion as defined in WAC 232-12-828.

To:

Party hunting is defined as shooting at or killing big game or turkeys for another ~~which another person tags~~, killing big game or turkeys with the intention of having another person tag the animal, or tagging a big game animal or turkey ~~which~~ that another person has killed.

Party hunting is illegal for big game and turkey, except for hunters with disabilities ~~and their~~ who have a designated hunting companion as defined in WAC 232-12-828.

This change is to address an attempt to kill another person's game as well as actually killing it. The edit to the hunter's with disabilities section is for clarification.

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### **Background:**

Department staff will provide a brief overview to the Commission on proposed amendments to WAC 232-28-273 2009-2011 Moose, bighorn sheep, and mountain goat seasons and permit quotas. This will include any changes resulting from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

Winter surveys indicate moose populations are fairly stable. The Department recommends a status quo permit level of 130, which includes slight reductions in some units and additions in others. We are also creating a Master Hunter damage hunt in the Mount Spokane unit.

All bighorn sheep populations that are currently hunted either meet or exceed population objectives. Due to increased ewe densities in some herds, the Department recommends adding ewe-only hunts (including one ewe hunt for youth-only) in three herds; the recommendation is to increase bighorn sheep permit levels from 36 to 40.

Results from the Department's mountain goat research project indicate that mountain goats are extremely sensitive to over harvest. Although goats occur in many alpine areas of the State, several populations are relatively small (<100) and isolated. As such, the Department revised the thresholds for mountain goat harvest in the 2009-2015 Game Management Plan (GMP). Following the GMP, the Department is recommending limiting goat hunting to population management units of  $\geq 100$  goats, which results in six population management units being hunted with a total of 18 permits. The Department is also recommending allowing Director authority for distributing the harvest and reducing permit levels within a population management unit if necessary. Distributing harvest will be accomplished by providing maps to hunters of areas that are open and/or closed within the larger unit. Permit levels would only be slightly reduced if actual harvest levels exceeded target.

### **Policy Issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:**

Continued hunting of moose, bighorn sheep, and mountain goat through a permit-only system.

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### **Public involvement process used and what you learned:**

The Department conducted an extensive public involvement process to develop these three-year hunting season cycle recommendations. In June 2008, the Department received nearly 4,000 responses to a scoping survey that was developed to determine the major issues that were important to the public. After the initial scoping phase, the issues were refined and preferred alternatives to address those issues were developed. The alternatives were discussed at more than ten public meetings held throughout the state in August and September. Nearly 5,000 people commented on the Alternatives, which were presented at the public meetings and available online for approximately seven weeks. In early January, an email was sent to over 50,000 hunters announcing that the proposed recommendations were online and would be available for comment

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until February 20. A postcard was mailed to approximately 800 organizations and individuals informing them of the opportunity to provide comments on the proposed regulations. 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### **Background:**

Department staff will provide a brief overview to the Commission on proposed amendments to the following WACs: 232-12-051 Muzzleloading firearms; 232-12-054 Archery requirements – Archery special use permits; and 232-12-047 Unlawful methods for hunting. This will include any changes resulting from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

The 2009-2011 hunting issues brought before the public this summer and fall included topics related to hunting methods and hunting equipment. They included:

- Muzzleloading equipment and definitions related to ignition systems, use of scopes, propellants, and projectiles.
- Addressing urban and suburban hunting and firearm restriction areas.

In addition groups represented on the Game Management Advisory Council provided input on a number of issues related to these WACs. The public encouraged the Department to make several changes that the Department could accommodate while sustaining the wildlife resource.

The following hunting equipment and hunting restriction WACs are presented for revision or clarification:

- "Muzzleloading firearms"- to clarify caliber and ignition system restrictions. New changes to the WAC propose allowing any type of projectile rather than restricting to lead-only bullets, allowing muzzleloader handguns for big game hunting, and not restricting the use of modern handguns for personal protection during a muzzleloader season for those who have a concealed pistol permit.
  - "Archery requirements"- to allow the use of crossbows in designated areas (i.e., firearm restriction areas during modern firearm season); clarify some language and propose new language that does not restrict the use of modern handguns for personal protection during an archery season for those who have a concealed pistol permit.
  - "Special closures and firearm restriction areas" to allow the use of crossbows in firearm restriction areas during modern firearm season and to clarify the intent of firearm restrictions in Whatcom and Skagit counties to only apply to big game hunting only.
  - "Unlawful methods for hunting"- to clarify the distinction between modern handguns and muzzleloader handguns, and also to allow the use of crossbows during modern firearm seasons in firearm restriction areas.

### **Policy Issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:**

- WAC 232-12-051 Clarify the muzzleloading rules while retaining the primitive nature of the firearm. Allow bullets made of any material to be used rather than just lead bullets. Allow persons with a concealed pistol license to carry a modern handgun during muzzleloader hunting season.
  - WAC 232-12-054 Allow all modern firearm hunters to use crossbows in firearm restriction areas during modern season, to provide additional tools for deer and elk hunting in urbanized settings. Allow persons with a concealed pistol license to carry a modern handgun during an archery hunting season.
  - WAC 232-28-248 Allow crossbows in firearm restriction areas during modern firearm season. Retain the original intent of firearm restrictions in Whatcom and Skagit counties to only apply to big game hunting.
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- 232-12-047 Allow crossbows to be used during a modern firearm season in a firearm restriction area. Clarify when modern handguns can be used for hunting.

The Department conducted an extensive public involvement process to develop these three-year hunting season cycle recommendations. In June 2008, the Department received nearly 4,000 responses to a scoping survey that was developed to determine the major issues that were important to the public. After the initial scoping phase, the issues were refined and preferred alternatives to address those issues were developed. 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**Justification for Commission action:**

Provide flexibility for management and hunting season structures. Provide clarification to equipment restriction rules and not infringe on 2<sup>nd</sup> amendment rights.

**Page 14**

Under section 1.a., add after the word “protection” the following: “if that person possesses a concealed pistol license as defined in RCW 9.41.070”. This change addresses the issue of a more limited approach to allowing handguns for personal protection to those who qualify for a concealed pistol license.

**Pages 14-15**

Under section 1.e., change the second sentence from:

Disabled hunter permittees in possession of a crossbow special use permit may hunt with a crossbow.

To:

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~~Disabled~~ However, disabled hunter permittees in possession of a crossbow special use permit may hunt with a crossbow in any season that allows archery equipment.

This adjustment clarifies that disabled hunter permittees may hunt with a crossbow during any season that allows archery equipment.

<b>COMMENTS</b>	<b>AGENCY RESPONSE</b>
I would recommend that archery hunters be allowed to carry a pistol if they have a concealed weapons permit.	We have made that change. Thank you for your comment.
Don't change regulations on bullets for muzzleloaders. Jacketed bullets will extend the range for the muzzleloader. I don't support muzzleloader handguns either.	The vast majority of the respondents on the public surveys supported the proposed change to muzzleloader equipment. Over 70% of the muzzleloaders that responded wanted this change. The Department is moving forward with the recommendation. If success rates change substantially for muzzleloaders the hunting seasons will be adjusted accordingly.  Twenty-two other states allow muzzleloading handguns for deer and other big game. With the help of the Washington State Muzzleloader's Association and the Borderline Bass and Contenders, the Agency feels it has written appropriate restrictions to this rule that will make muzzleloader handguns a viable hunting tool.
I don't support the ability to carry a handgun during archery seasons. Too modern.	The current proposed language would only allow those people that possessed a concealed pistol license. The Agency has received a lot of requests for this allowance.
Give crossbows its own WAC and don't blend issues.	The Agency will likely propose a stand-alone WAC for crossbows over time. Given the complexity of the 3-year package as it is, we decided to leave the language in the archery equipment WAC for the time being.
Concerned that felons will carry handguns if our regulations allow them during archery seasons.	The Administrative Codes that the Fish and Wildlife Commission adopts do not supersede legislative statute or federal law. If a state law, a federal law, or a court action prevented an individual from possessing a handgun or a firearm, the codes in question would not reverse that.

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### **Background:**

Department staff will provide a brief overview to the Commission on proposed amendments to the following WACs: 232-28-248 Special closures and firearm restriction areas; 232-28-333 Game management units (GMUs) boundary descriptions – Region three; 232-28-335 Game management units (GMUs) boundary descriptions – Region five; 232-28-336 Game management units (GMUs) boundary descriptions – Region six; and 232-28-337 Deer and elk area descriptions. This will include any changes resulting from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

The 2009-2011 hunting issues brought before the public this summer and fall included topics related to Game Management Units and Deer and Elk Areas. There was strong support for the boundary changes that were proposed for GMUs 568, 574, 578, and 388. In addition groups represented on the Game Management Advisory Council provided input on a number of issues related to these WACs. Many of the proposals are designed to address problems with damage and nuisance animals. The following are recommended changes for GMUs, Deer Areas, Elk Areas, and Firearm Restriction Areas:

- Boundary changes are proposed for GMUs 568, 574, 578, and 388 to better match the landscape and habitat within GMU and to better match deer management objectives without complicating elk management objectives.
  - An adjustment to the boundary between GMUs 505 and 510 near Davis Lake would allow more antlerless elk harvest to take place during archery and muzzleloader elk seasons in this problem area.
  - A discrepancy on the border between GMU 673 and GMU 506 was fixed by emergency rule. That correction needs to be made permanent in the WAC.
  - New Elk Areas are needed in Regions 1 and 4 to accommodate new elk hunts (North Bend) or to better direct elk hunters to specific sites. Elk Area boundaries need adjusting in Regions 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6
  - New Deer Areas are needed to deal with damage and nuisance deer in Regions 1, 2, and 5. Deer Area boundaries need adjusting in Regions 3, 5, and 6.

### **Policy Issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:**

- Shift the boundaries in GMUs 568, 574, 578, and 388 so that management and harvest strategies better match the habitat and the deer and elk populations within GMUs.
  - Provide the means to address wildlife damage and nuisance issues by modifying existing boundaries or by creating new Deer and Elk Areas.
  - Maintain limited deer and elk hunting opportunity adjacent to expanding human development.

COMMENTS	AGENCY RESPONSE
Opposed to the GMU 388/578 shift. Leave the Klickitat River as the boundary.	The Klickitat River is currently not the boundary. We are proposing that the River be the boundary. Thank you for your support.
Don't change GMU 388. It takes the late season away. Keep it the late archery hunt.	There would still be an early archery season. There are also late archery opportunities in nearby GMUs. The Regional biologists feel very strongly that the late season vulnerability of deer needs to be addressed to improve the post-hunt characteristics of the deer population. The current season structure that includes a late general season for archers is not sustainable.

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### **Background:**

Department staff will provide a brief overview to the Commission on proposed rule amendments to the following WACs: 232-28-351 2009-2011 Deer general seasons and definitions; and 232-28-353 2009 Deer special permits. This will include any changes resulting from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

The issues brought before the public this summer and fall included changes to deer seasons in Regions 1, 2, 3, and 5. The public encouraged the Department to make several changes that the Department could accommodate while sustaining the wildlife resource:

- Opening more GMUs to muzzleloader general season opportunity for deer, as well as a longer early general season time period and less overlap with muzzleloader elk season.
- Shifting antlerless white-tailed deer special permits to "2<sup>nd</sup> deer" opportunities in Region 1.
- Offering more late season deer special permits in Region 2 GMUs.
- Shifting early muzzleloader and late archery opportunity to a late muzzleloader season structure in GMU 381.
- Changing the season structure for GMUs 388, 574, and 578 to improve low buck survival and/or low total deer numbers to ultimately provide a better hunting experience.

As a result of either Agency management objectives or the public support (sometimes strong support), the following are recommended hunting season proposals for 2009-2011 general deer seasons and special permits for the fall of 2009:

- Increase the number of GMUs open for general season muzzleloader opportunity. Increase the general muzzleloader season from 7 to 9 days, and shift the timing to decrease some of the overlap with muzzleloader elk season.
- Shift the antlerless permits in GMUs 101-142 to "2<sup>nd</sup> deer" permits.
- Increase the number of GMUs open to late season special permit opportunities in Region 2, including allowing all three user groups the opportunity to apply for late permits in GMU 247.
- Shift GMU 250 from late general season archery for 3pt. min and antlerless to a 3 pt. min. only to reduce high hunter pressure and hunter crowding
- Reduce the amount of hunter pressure while deer are on winter range in GMUs 209, 215, 233, 243, and 250.
- Shift early muzzleloader and late archery opportunity to a late muzzleloader season structure in GMU 381.
- Move GMU 574 to "any buck", move GMU 578 to "3 pt. min.", and reduce the late season pressure in GMU 388 from general season to special permit.
- Reduce the early archery general season to accommodate the increased muzzleloader general season.

In addition, the Allocation Sub-Committee and the full Game Management Advisory Council (GMAC) recommended that the Department develop some new special permit hunts for modern firearm hunters during the peak of the rut for deer. These proposed hunts should provide some additional opportunity for modern firearm hunters at times when mature bucks are available. To accommodate this change we are also proposing a reduction of days in the late archery general

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season to accommodate the increased premium special permits offered to all three user groups. Additional recommendations in response to overall population concerns:

- Adjust the number of late season special permits for modern firearm hunters.
  - Reduce the antlerless white-tailed deer opportunity in Region 1 in general and permit seasons.
- 

**Policy Issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:**

- Provide balanced hunting opportunities for modern firearm, archery, and muzzleloader deer hunters.
  - Maintain general deer hunting season opportunities, while meeting population objectives.
  - Adjust deer special permits in response to population changes and damage complaints.

**Public involvement process used and what you learned:**

The Department conducted an extensive public involvement process to develop these three-year hunting season cycle recommendations. In June 2008, the Department received nearly 4,000 responses to a scoping survey that was developed to determine the major issues that were important to the public. After the initial scoping phase, the issues were refined and preferred alternatives to address those issues were developed. The alternatives were discussed at more than ten public meetings held throughout the state in August and September. Nearly 5,000 people commented on the Alternatives, which were presented at the public meetings and available online for approximately seven weeks. In early January, an email was sent to over 50,000 hunters announcing that the proposed recommendations were online and would be available for comment until February 20. A postcard was mailed to approximately 800 organizations and individuals informing them of the opportunity to provide comments on the proposed regulations. Oral public testimony (if any was received) from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting is located at the end of this agenda item. Advisory groups were utilized throughout the process. The Game Management Advisory Council is split on some of the proposed changes. The archery representatives are against the shift of some late general season opportunity to a special permit opportunity. Muzzleloader representatives are in favor of the increased number of GMUs open, adding two days to the early general season, and eliminating some of some overlap with elk season.

The 2009-2011 hunting issues brought before the public this summer and fall included changes to elk seasons. The public encouraged the Department to make several changes that the Department could accommodate while sustaining the wildlife resource:

- The Colockum elk herd has consistently been below post-hunt population objectives for bulls. One aspect of this problem is low yearling bull survival. The Colockum herd has averaged less than 9 bulls per 100 cows in recent years. A high percentage of Colockum yearling bulls have antlers that branch and fork. By only allowing harvest of yearling bulls with a single antler point on both sides, we may be able to improve yearling survival in some of the core GMUs for the Colockum herd.
- In the last 3-year package (2006-2008), WDFW added an additional day to the modern firearm general elk season in western Washington, increasing the season from nine days to ten days. The Department committed to evaluate the results of lengthening the season. Initial analysis does not indicate an obvious change in bull harvest or a measurable change in post-hunt bull ratios.

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### **Background:**

Department staff will provide a brief overview to the Commission on proposed amendments to WAC 232-28-342 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 Small game seasons. This will include any changes resulting from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting in Ellensburg.

The revised WAC describes season timing, hunting requirements, applicable permit levels, and bag limits for the following species: bobcat, raccoon, fox, coyote, forest grouse, pheasant, chukar, gray partridge, mountain quail, California quail, bobwhite, quail, wild turkey, Canada goose, band-tailed pigeon, mourning dove, cottontail rabbits, snowshoe hare, and crow. It also describes falconry and dog training seasons. For the most part, proposed hunting season timing does not change from recent years. The daily bag limit for forest grouse is proposed to increase from 3 to 4. Data show that over the past 25 years hunters harvest fewer than three forest grouse per year and fewer than 0.5 birds per day hunted.

The Department is recommending making it unlawful to hunt coyotes with the use of dogs. The recommendation is based on input from the public via the Washington State legislature. Even though the recommendation is not based on the biological status of coyotes, the Department is bringing this issue before the commission due to our desire to address social issues with hunting during the Commission process rather than legislative process.

Turkey populations in Washington continue to grow, especially in northeastern Washington. Over the past several years, fall turkey regulations have been increasingly liberalized and exponential population growth has stopped. Both biologists and local citizens want a reduced population in northeastern WA, so additional fall hunting opportunity is being proposed by extending the early fall season by one week and changing the late fall season to a general season rather than a permit season. In addition, as populations continue to increase, other early fall permit season opportunities can be expanded in the Blue Mountains and Klickitat County.

The eastside September Canada goose season was initiated in several counties in 1996 and expanded to all of eastern Washington in 1997. When the season was first established, its continuation was based on several population criteria levels. These criteria levels were later revised in the Pacific Flyway Council's Pacific Population of Western Canada Goose Management Plan (2001 revision). These index levels were also adopted in the WDFW Game Management Plans for 2003-2009 and 2009-2015. The 3-year average eastern Washington nest index for 2005-2007 was 1,935, falling below the 2,000 trigger level to restrict or discontinue the season. This index has shown a gradual decline since the September season was initiated in 1997. It is also unlikely that the September goose season is contributing to goose population control in urban / suburban areas, because few geese marked in these areas are recovered in the September season. We are proposing elimination of the two-day September season in eastern Washington, but would add these two days to the regular goose season, which begins in mid-October. If the nest index increases above the 2,000 trigger level in the future, the season will be reinstated.

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**Policy Issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:**

- Control of northeastern turkey population expansion by liberalizing fall turkey hunting through more general season opportunity.
  - Continue to provide hunting opportunity for pheasant, quail, gray partridge, chukar, forest grouse, and small game animals.
  - Increase the daily bag limit for forest grouse to four per day.
  - Eliminate the use of dogs to hunt coyotes.
  - Eliminate the two-day September Canada Goose Season.

**Public involvement process used and what you learned:**

The Department conducted an extensive public involvement process to develop these three-year hunting season cycle recommendations. In June 2008, the Department received nearly 4,000 responses to a scoping survey that was developed to determine the major issues that were important to the public. After the initial scoping phase, the issues were refined and preferred alternatives to address those issues were developed. The alternatives were discussed at more than ten public meetings held throughout the state in August and September. Nearly 5,000 people commented on the Alternatives, which were presented at the public meetings and available online for approximately seven weeks. In early January, an email was sent to over 50,000 hunters announcing that the proposed recommendations were online and would be available for comment until February 20. A postcard was mailed to approximately 800 organizations and individuals informing them of the opportunity to provide comments on the proposed regulations. Oral public testimony (if any was received) from the March 6-7, 2009 Commission meeting is located at the end of this agenda item. Most of the issues in this proposed WAC were also reviewed by the Upland Game Advisory Committee and received approval from a majority of the members responding. Additional public comments were received at the March 6 Fish and Wildlife Commission meeting.

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**Action requested (identify the specific Commission decisions you are seeking):**

Amend WAC 232-28-342 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 Small game seasons, as presented.

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**Draft motion language:**

I move to amend WAC 232-28-342, as proposed.

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**Justification for Commission action:**

The proposed changes provide small game hunting opportunities as well as additional turkey hunting opportunities in areas where turkey populations are expanding or are at higher levels than desired.
