ENVIRONMENTAL CHECKLIST

Purpose of checklist:

The State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA), chapter 43.21C RCW, requires all governmental agencies to consider the environmental impacts of a proposal before making decisions. An environmental impact statement (EIS) must be prepared for all proposals with probable significant adverse impacts on the quality of the environment. The purpose of this checklist is to provide information to help you and the agency identify impacts from your proposal (and to reduce or avoid impacts from the proposal, if it can be done) and to help the agency decide whether an EIS is required.

Instructions for applicants:

This environmental checklist asks you to describe some basic information about your proposal. Governmental agencies use this checklist to determine whether the environmental impacts of your proposal are significant, requiring preparation of an EIS. Answer the questions briefly, with the most precise information known, or give the best description you can.

You must answer each question accurately and carefully, to the best of your knowledge. In most cases, you should be able to answer the questions from your own observations or project plans without the need to hire experts. If you really do not know the answer, or if a question does not apply to your proposal, write "do not know" or "does not apply." Complete answers to the questions now may avoid unnecessary delays later.

Some questions ask about governmental regulations, such as zoning, shoreline, and landmark designations. Answer these questions if you can. If you have problems, the governmental agencies can assist you.

The checklist questions apply to all parts of your proposal, even if you plan to do them over a period of time or on different parcels of land. Attach any additional information that will help describe your proposal or its environmental effects. The agency to which you submit this checklist may ask you to explain your answers or provide additional information reasonably related to determining if there may be significant adverse impact.

Some of the roads proposed for abandonment will need to be covered under a Forest Practices Activities (FPA) permit issued by the Washington State Department of Natural Resources.

Peterman Hill has over 75 miles of road within ~6,800 acres. Under the management plan for the Cowlitz Wildlife Area road densities will be reduced to approximately 1.5 miles of “open” road per square mile of land. Much of the roads are already controlled by gates that permit vehicular access to the public on a seasonal basis and walk in traffic throughout the year. The roads proposed for abandonment have been identified as not necessary for operational purposes and their abandonment will have no real negative benefits to public access while providing positive benefits to wildlife. The work proposed to “officially” abandon these roads will consist of controlling sediment delivery by installing water bars as needed, pulling culverts and providing ditch relief prior to a connection to fish bearing waters. Additionally, access by vehicular traffic will be prevented and the plant community will be allowed to naturally vegetate the area.



There are many small streams on the site draining into Riffe Lake. Sands Creek, Shelton Creek and Simmons Creek represent the main systems draining the project area.

Yes, culvert removal is necessary in select locations identified on the included table. The culvert removals will be conducted using BMP's and will be permitted by DNR through the Forest Practices Activities permit process. Application has not yet been submitted.
