MITIGATED DETERMINATION OF NON-SIGNIFICANCE

Name of Proposal: REFLECTION LAKE GRASS CARP

Description of Proposal: Plant triploid grass carp to control aquatic vegetation.

The applicant shall incorporate the following mitigation measure(s) into the project:

1. Screens shall be installed on all intake and/or outlet structures prior to obtaining fish planting permit.
2. Lake outlets and overflow shall be secured from possible vandalism by:
 - a: installation of bolt collar on north end overflow pipe screen;
 - b: installation of bolt and chain over the south end of screen;
 - c: installation of screen to a height of three feet above lake level in the overflow channel.

This work shall be performed prior to planting fish.

ENVIRONMENTAL CHECKLIST


