The Summary of 2010 Big Game General Seasons table has three errors:

- 1) The various end dates for the cougar season are 3/31/2011 (not 2010)
- 2) The modern firearm black-tailed deer season is November 18-21 (not 17-20)
- 3) The modern firearm white-tailed deer season is November 6-19 (not (5-19)

Page 116

The Advertisement for the 2010 Buckrun Mule Deer Raffle should list the cost per raffle entry as \$25.

Page 13 (added May 10 & updated on May 14)

The Refunds/Exchanges paragraph incorrectly states that "Exchanges of hunting license documents will not be made after the general season begins". This should state that "Exchanges of hunting license documents will not be made after 5:00 on May 26 for those applying for special permits or after the general hunting season opens (Sept. 15 for modern and muzzleloader tag holders and Sept. 1 for archery tag holders)".

In addition, the red sentence at the end of the paragraph refers to requests for having your points reinstated if you are unable to participate in the hunt. One of the following must be met to have your points reinstated:

- You are active duty military personnel and are transferred or otherwise obligated and unable to participate prior to the opening of the special hunt for which you were selected (documentation is required).
- If you, your spouse, immediate family member, or a group member are hospitalized or under the care of a physician making it impossible for you to participate in the hunt (documentation is required).
- Landowners within the hunt boundary did not allow access during the time of the hunt (verification is required).
- When regulations are in conflict and you, through no fault of your own, cannot participate.
- You made a mistake while submitting your application and you were selected for an unintended hunt. The permit must be returned to WDFW and be received or postmarked before the opening day of the special hunt (verification is required).
- If technical difficulties occur, that are solely the fault of WDFW, and result in your application being excluded from the drawing process.

Page 18

Under late archery, the legal deer in GMU 652 is Any Buck. In the pamphlet the unit appears in both the Any Deer and the Any Buck categories. It should only be in Any Buck.

Page 22

The GMUs for Hunt choice 1101 are correct, but the hunt was mistakenly named "East". The GMUs for Hunt choice 1102 are correct, but the hunt was mistakenly named "West".

<u>Page 25</u>

For the second deer category under the notes at the top, the notes should only include the following text:

Notes: You must purchase a second deer tag to participate in this hunt and the second tag can only be used in the permit hunt. The second tag must be the same weapon choice as your first tag.

Page 28

The GMUs for Hunt choice 1500 are correct, but the hunt was mistakenly named "East". The GMUs for Hunt choice 1501 are correct, but the hunt was mistakenly named "West".

Page 33 (added May 14)

The "Notes" section for the Master Hunter permit hunts listed at the bottom of the page incorrectly states that "A second tag must be purchased if selected for indicated hunts below." A second tag is not required for these hunts.

The Notes section should read: "You may hunt only with the hunting method in compliance with your tag. If purchased, the second tag can only be used during the permit hunt. Your first tag can be used to take a deer during this hunt. Second tags must be the same weapon choice as your first tag. Only 1 deer may be taken per deer tag."

Page 12 (added May 10)

The cost for a non-resident additional turkey tag is incorrectly listed as \$17.30. It should be \$72.50

Page 59 (added May 5)

Under the Commonly Asked Questions section: the last sentence reading "Individuals selected for a cougar permit must sign and return an affidavit indicating they read the materials an own a dog capable of tracking and baying a cougar" should read "Individuals selected for a cougar permit must sign and return an affidavit indicating they read the materials" the last part of the sentence should be deleted. As of this year this requirement no longer applies.

As you'll see, the "Hunter's Code" also addresses other issues important to the future of hunting. For example, one provision reads: "Learn more about wildlife and habitat issues, and urge policymakers to support strong conservation initiatives."

reminder that ethical conduct means more than just

While this section of the code may seem out of place next to such principles as "obey bag and possession limits," it is nonetheless an integral part of our hunting heritage.

For more than a century, hunters have been at the forefront of the American conservation movement, helping to shape management policies here and throughout the nation. That was just what President Theodore Roosevelt had in mind when he helped to create the North American Model of wildlife management, joining hunters and resource managers in a partnership for wildlife stewardship.

That system – which relies on field reports, policy recommendations, and license fees from hunters – has served us well over the past century. Today, amid escalating concerns about habitat loss and climate change, that kind of active involvement by hunters is more important than ever.

Consider: In 1901, when Teddy Roosevelt took office, there were approximately 600,000 people living in Washington state. Today, the state's population is estimated at 6.8 million – and expected to grow to 8.4 million in the next 20 years. We don't have to tell you the effect that kind of growth will have on wildlife habitat already strained by human development.

We believe it is essential that hunters engage in these broader issues, which are increasingly defining the debate over conservation throughout the nation. This doesn't mean that we should ignore such traditional concerns as access to private lands and allocation of hunting opportunities, but we do need to participate in the wider debate to ensure that hunting remains viable in our state in the years ahead.

One good source of information is available at www.seasonsend.org, and we highly recommend a new publication titled "Beyond Seasons' End," which describes the challenges ahead.

For the past century, hunters and wildlife managers have worked together under a model of wildlife management widely acclaimed as the most successful system of wildlife stewardship in the world. Working together, we believe we can conserve Washington's fish and wildlife resources, and the future of hunting in our state.

Hunting in a Changing World

We hope that you will be able to get out and enjoy one or more of the many great hunting opportunities offered this year. Our hunting seasons and management measures have been crafted to meet our conservation objectives and to provide hunting opportunities on healthy wildlife populations.

After a mild winter, hunting prospects generally appear favorable for the fall season. Hunters gearing up for the 2010 season can also look forward to several new hunting opportunities, ranging from peak-season quality hunts for bulls and bucks to an expanded fall turkey hunt.

As you prepare to take to the field, we would like to make you aware of several issues affecting the upcoming season and the future of hunting in Washington.

New system for special-hunt drawings

This year, for the first time, hunters will be able to apply for special permits for big-game hunts in several different categories, ranging from buck or bull permits to senior permits. This new approach will allow you to apply under as many categories as you are qualified to hunt.

One goal of the new application system is to provide more options for hunters seeking permits. Another is to generate revenue to expand the hunter access program on private lands. Under this new plan, points accrued by hunters toward special-hunt permits in previous years will be applied to each of the new permit categories.

The application period for special-hunt permits runs from April 26 to May 26 this year. See pages 80-82 for more information about these new opportunities.

Public perceptions and ethical conduct

Recent surveys have shown that more than 80 percent of Washington citizens support legal hunting in this state. That's encouraging, especially at a time when a growing segment of our society has never been hunting. Public perceptions are important, and all of us have a role to play in maintaining general support for hunting.

For that reason, we often remind non-hunters of the vital role hunters play in managing state wildlife populations. We also know that hunters dedicate tens of thousands of volunteer hours each year to conservation projects, and that a significant portion of our state's wildlife-management efforts are supported by the license fees and excise taxes you pay to hunt.

Unfortunately, public perceptions of hunting have been tarnished by several distasteful – and well-publicized – events involving hunters in recent years. While some cases involve illegal activities, many can be attributed to poor judgment or a lapse in ethical conduct in the field.

These incidents detract from the important work hunters do as stewards of the resource, and suggest that we could all benefit from reviewing the "Hunter's Code of Conduct" on page 86 of this pamphlet. While the principles outlined there may be second nature to most of us, they are a timely



Drawing for Lifetime License

The drawing for lifetime privileges offers an opportunity to receive complimentary recreational licenses for the rest of your life. You will never have to buy another base license for as long as you hunt or fish! Here's what to do:



Wait to Hear: A minimum of two winners are selected in each of the four drawings. Each application will be included in at least four drawings or until selected. That means that there are eight chances to win. WDFW will notify the winner by certified mail.

Claim your Prize: The winner is responsible for claiming the prize within 15 days of receiving their certified letter. If the winner chooses to give their lifetime eligibility as a gift, they must notify WDFW who they are giving it to at the time it is claimed. Base Licenses Include:

License Information & Mandatory Reporting

Duplicate Licenses & Tags

If hunting license or tag documents are lost, stolen, or destroyed, duplicates can be obtained from license dealers for a cost

Refunds/Exchanges

There are no refunds for hunting licenses or transport tags. Exchanges of hunting license documents will not be made after the general season begins. If you applied and were selected for a special permit in error or if you are not able to participate in the hunt due to illness or deployment, contact the Wildlife Program at (360) 902-2515.

Vehicle Use Permit

A Vehicle Use Permit is required for use of all posted WDFW lands. Your first vehicle use permit is free with the purchase of a hunting, fishing, or trapping license, or can be purchased separately. The permit must be clearly displayed and visible from outside of the vehicle. It can be placed on the dash or hung from the rearview mirror.

Social Security Numbers

Federal and state law requires persons 15 or older to give their Social Security Number in order to obtain a license. (Federal Law US Code: Title 42, Section 666, Paragraph 13, Section A; and RCW 77.32.014)

Watchable Wildlife Decals

You can purchase a Watchable Wildlife decal. Decals come with educational wildlife viewing material and a vehicle use permit that provides access to WDFW-managed lands. The cost is \$30. These are available online at fishhunt.dfw.wa.gov, via phone at 1-866-246-9453, or wherever fishing and hunting licenses are sold.

Youth Donations

Hunting Activity Reporting

By January 31, 2011, hunters must report their hunting activity for each special permit acquired and each deer, elk, bear, and turkey tag purchased in 2010. You are not required to report cougar transport tags unless you harvest a cougar (see hide sealing requirements on page 57). Hunters who do not meet the deadline must pay a \$10 penalty before they can buy a license the following year. There are now separate hunter reports for general season hunting activity and for special permits. If your

Reports are not accepted by mail or email. Please do not send in your transport tags.

special-permit hunting season extends beyond January 31, your hunter report is due within 10 days of the close of that season. One hunter report is required for each transport tag acquired and should be completed when you are done hunting the general season for that species. The special hunt permit reports should be completed at the end of the special hunt season. You will receive a confirmation number for each successfully submitted hunter report. Be sure to keep all of your confirmation numbers.

Incentive Permit Drawing for Early Reporting

Hunters who report harvest within 10 days of killing an animal or by January 10, if unsuccessful, will be entered into a drawing for a special incentive permit. The nine special permits include two any elk permits for western Washington, two any elk permits for eastern Washington, and five statewide any deer permits. If your special permit hunting season extends beyond January 31, you will be included in the incentive drawing if you make a report within 10 days of the close of that season. The incentive drawing is usually held in April.

Incentive Permit Season

Incentive permits are valid for areas open to general hunting seasons or special permit hunting seasons. The hunt dates are September 1 through December 31. The permits require a hunter to use archery equipment during archery season, muzzleloader equipment during muzzleloader season, and any legal weapon at other times if there are no firearm restrictions.

Paving for Incentive Permits

Hunters who win the special incentive permit must send the appropriate license fee to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) Headquarters office in Olympia. WDFW will mail the license and transport tag to the permit winners.

Definitions

Antler Point-Deer: A projection off any part of the antler measuring at least one (1) inch in length measured from the longest side. Eye guards are antler points if they are at least one inch long.

Antler Point-Elk: A projection off any part of the antler measuring at least one (1) inch in length measured from the longest side. Eye guards are antler points if they are at least one inch long.

Antlerless: Deer, elk, or moose without antlers; doe and fawn deer and cow and calf elk and moose are considered antlerless.

Any Buck/Bull: Only deer/elk with visible antlers may be taken (fawns/calves illegal). Visible antler is a horn-like growth projecting above the hairline.

Bag Limit: Maximum number of game animals or game birds that may be taken, caught, killed, or possessed by a person for a specific period of time, or limits on the size, sex, or species.

Big Game: Elk, deer, bear, moose, mountain goat, bighorn sheep, and cougar.

Black-tailed Deer: Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species Odocoileus hemionus) found west of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

Closed Area: Area where the hunting of some species of wild animals or wild birds is prohibited.

Closed Season: All times, areas, and manners when the taking of wild animals and wild birds is prohibited.

Dashed - - - Lines or Hyphens:

"Through" and is inclusive of those items; e.g., Sept. 1-30 means: Sept. 1 through Sept. 30. GMUs 124-136 means: all GMUs from 124 through 136.

Hunter with Disability: See page 84. **Eastern Washington:** Includes all areas lying east of the Pacific Crest Trail and east of the Big White Salmon River in Klickitat and Skamania counties.

Endangered Species: Wildlife designated by the Fish and Wildlife Commission because the species is seriously threatened with extinction.

General Season: Any hunting season that is open to all licensed hunters, excluding special permit-only, damage and landowner damage hunts.

GMU: Game Management Unit Boundary descriptions are used for management purposes.

Horn: A hard body permanent projection that grows on the head of mountain goats and bighorn sheep.

Hunt Choice Number: The four-digit number required on special permit application submissions.

To Hunt: Any effort to kill, capture, injure, or harass a wild animal or wild bird.

Migratory Game Birds: Coots, ducks, geese (including brant), mourning doves, bandtailed pigeons, and snipe.

Military Personnel: Military personnel, permanently stationed at a military installation within the state of Washington, regardless of length of time in the state, are entitled to purchase a resident license. All military personnel must have appropriate license, tags, stamps, or permits to fish or hunt anywhere in the state. Dependents must establish a 90-day residency.

Mule Deer: Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species Odocoileus hemionus) found east of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

Non-resident: A person who has not fulfilled the qualifications (90 days) of a resident. (Exception—See Military Personnel)

Open Season: All times, areas, and manner for legally hunting or possessing game animals or game birds. All hunting season dates listed in this pamphlet are inclusive.

Permit Only Season: Any hunting season that is open to a limited number of hunters.

Protected Wildlife: Wildlife designated by the Fish and Wildlife Commission that are not to be hunted or fished.

Public Highway: Any road, regardless of surface, maintained by public funds.

Resident: A person who has maintained a permanent place of abode within this state for at least 90 days immediately preceding an application for a WDFW license; has established by formal evidence (drivers license or voter registration card) an intent to continue residing within this state; and who is not licensed to hunt or fish as a resident in another state.

Safety Zone: An area posted to no hunting by the WDFW for safety purposes.

Special Hunting Seasons: Hunting seasons set by rule of the Fish and Wildlife Commission for the purpose of taking specified wildlife with a special hunting permit.

Spike Bull Areas: Elk taken in these units

must have at least one antler with no branches originating more than four inches above where the antler attaches to the skull. An animal with a spike on one side (1x2) is legal in spike only units. An animal with more than one antler point more than four inches above where the antler attaches to the skull on both sides (2x2) is illegal.

Two Point Minimum Buck: Any buck deer with at least two antler points on one antler is legal.

Three Point Minimum Buck: Any buck deer with at least three antler points on one antler is legal.

Three Point Minimum Bull: Any bull elk with at least 3 antler points on one side with at least 2 of those antler points above the ear.

True Spike Bull Restrictions: Bull elk taken in these units must have both antlers with no branching originating more than four inches above where the antlers attach to the skull. Under the true spike restriction, the taking of an elk that has two points on one side or has antler points within one inch of the definitions regarding length of point, or point of origination is an infraction. All other types of violations of the true spike restriction are subject to current penalties and assessments.

Upland Game Birds: Quail, chukar, pheasant, and gray partridge. Grouse are not upland birds.

Valid License: A current unaltered license issued to the holder for the specific game animal hunted.

Valid Tag: A current, unaltered, unnotched tag issued to the holder to hunt for the specified game animal on the tag.

Visible Antler: A horn-like growth on the head of deer, elk, or moose that projects above the hairline.

Western Washington: All areas west of the Pacific Crest Trail and west of (and including) the Big White Salmon River in Klickitat and Skamania counties.

White-tailed Deer: Means any white-tailed deer (species Odocoileus virginianus) except the Columbian White-tailed deer (species Odocoileus virginianus leucurus).

Wild Animals: Includes all mammals except feral domestic mammals and old world rats and mice.

Wild Birds: All species of birds that exist in Washington in the wild state.

Youth: Under 16 years of age at time of license purchase or special permit application purchase.

Required to Hunt

Proof of Hunter Education

When purchasing a license, all individuals born after January 1, 1972 must show proof that they have completed a hunter education class. See page 87 for hunter education deferral options.

Age Requirements and Restrictions

All hunters, regardless of age, must have in their possession a valid hunting license and any required tags, permits, or stamps to hunt wildlife. Youth under 16 need a state hunting license. Youth are eligible for reduced license fees.

Exhibit of License, Permits, Stamps, Tags, and Wildlife

You are required to show a license, tag or permit, or display wildlife taken when asked to by a Fish and Wildlife officer or other law officer. You are also required to comply with the directions of WDFW personnel related to the collection of sampling data and/or material from wildlife.

Hunter Orange

Under the following conditions a minimum of 400 square inches of fluorescent hunter orange exterior clothing is required. It must be worn above the waist and be visible from all sides. A hat, by itself, does not meet this requirement.

- Anyone hunting deer or elk during any modern firearm deer or elk general season is required to wear fluorescent hunter orange clothing. All modern firearm permit holders must wear fluorescent hunter orange clothing. This includes archers and muzzleloaders while hunting in units (e.g. GMUs, Deer, Areas, Elk Areas, Wilderness Areas, etc...) that overlap modern firearm seasons.
- Anyone hunting in an area that is open for modern firearm deer or elk
 hunting must meet hunter orange requirements if they are hunting any
 of the following species: Bear, Bobcat, Cougar, Coyote, Deer, Elk, Fox,
 Grouse, Hare, Rabbit, or Raccoon.
- During any upland game bird season, anyone hunting upland game birds or rabbits with a modern firearm is required to wear fluorescent hunter orange clothing. (Grouse are not upland game birds.)

Hunter Orange Clothing is Not Required:

- During an upland game bird season for anyone hunting upland game birds with a muzzleloading firearm, bow and arrow, or for falconry.
- While hunting in a muzzleloading or archery only GMU and possessing a valid muzzleloading or archery deer or elk tag.

Fish and Wildlife Check Stations

Any hunter may be directed to stop at WDFW check stations and produce wildlife in their possession. Fish and Wildlife Officers may stop any person involved in a hunting or fishing activity for the purpose of inspecting hunting and fishing equipment, licenses, tags, or catch record cards and to inspect all fish and wildlife in their possession.

Non-United States Citizens

Special regulations concerning firearms possession may apply to non-United States citizens. If you are not a United States citizen and plan to hunt with a modern firearm, contact the Washington Department of Licensing (360) 664-6616 or your consulate before you purchase a hunting license.

Note

Licenses, tags, stamps, or permits may be required for wildlife-related activities not covered in this pamphlet.

Major Causes of Hunting Accidents

Careless handling of firearms is the cause of most hunting-related accidents. Careless handling accidents can be prevented if shooters follow three simple rules:


- Treat every firearm as if it were loaded. Keep the firearm pointed in a safe direction at all times.
- 2. Keep the firearm's safety on and the chamber empty until ready to fire.
- 3. Keep fingers away from the trigger until you are ready to fire.


Wildlife Area Users & Hydraulic Project Approval Applicants

To Hunt Deer in Washington:

- 1. Purchase a big game hunting license with deer as a species option.
- 2. Choose the appropriate deer transport tag for one of the following hunting methods: modern firearm, muzzleloader, or archery.
- 3. The general season dates for the hunting method you have chosen are listed on the following pages. Hunt only the seasons outlined for the hunting method on your tag.
- 4. You may apply for hunts that are open to hunters by special permit only. See pages 20-33 for the list of available permit hunts. See pages 80-82 for special permit application instructions.
- 5. When you are finished hunting you must report your hunting activity online at fishhunt.dfw.wa.gov or by calling 1-877-945-3492. See page 13 for more information.

Definitions:

2 Pt. Minimum:

A legal deer taken in these GMUs must have at least 2 antler points on one side. (A 2x2 or a 2x1 are legal in a 2 pt. min. unit.) All antler points must be at least one inch long measured on the longest side. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long.

3 Pt. Minimum:

A legal deer taken in these GMUs must have at least 3 antler points on one side. (A 3x3, 3x2, or 3x1 are legal in a 3 Pt. min. unit.) All antler points must be at least one inch long measured on the longest side. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long.

Antlerless:

Deer without antlers. Doe or fawn deer are antlerless.

Anv Buck:

Any deer with visible antlers may be taken (fawns illegal).

Black-tailed Deer:


Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species Odocoileus hemionus) found west of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

Mule Deer:

Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species Odocoileus hemionus) found east of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

White-tailed Deer:

Any white-tailed deer (member of the species Odocoileus virginianus) except the Columbian Whitetailed Deer (species Odocoileus virginianus leucurus).

The Department asks that you please return any radio-collars from animals that you have harvested. Contact the researcher or government agency marked on the radio-collar, or notify your local WDFW Enforcement Officer or biologist that you have harvested a radio-marked animal and they will make arrangements to return the equipment to the appropriate individuals. Your cooperation will help us manage for healthy, viable big game populations.

Elk General Information

To Hunt Elk in Washington:

- 1. Purchase a big game hunting license with elk as a species option.
- Choose the elk tag for the area you will hunt in and the hunting method you will use. You must select one hunting method modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader.
- 3. The general season dates for the hunting method you have chosen are listed on the following pages.
- 4. You may apply for hunts that are open to hunters by special permit only. See pages 45-56 for the list of permit hunts and the specific tag needed in order to apply for each hunt. See pages 80-82 for special permit application instructions.
- When you are finished hunting you must report your hunting activity online at fishhunt.dfw.wa.gov or by calling 1-877-945-3492. See page 13 for more information.

Definitions:

3 Point Minimum:

A 3 Pt. Min. elk means that a legal elk in these GMUs must have at least 3 antler points on one side, at least 2 antler points above the ear. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long. A 1x3 and a 2x3 are legal elk in a 3 Pt. Min. unit. Antler restrictions apply to all hunters during any open season.

Antler Points:

To qualify as a point, an antler point must be at least one-inch in length measured on the longest side.

Any Bull Elk Seasons:

Open only to the taking of elk with visible antlers (bull calves are illegal).

Any Elk:

Any elk may be taken. Referred to as "Either Sex" in the past.

Branch:

A branch is defined as any projection off the main antler beam that is at least one inch long, measured on the longest side, and longer than it is wide.

Spike Bull Restrictions:


Elk taken in these units must have at least one antler with no branches originating more than four inches above where the antler attaches to the skull. An animal with a spike on one side (1x2) is legal in spike only units. An animal with more than one antler point more than four inches above where the antler attaches to the skull on both sides (2x2) is illegal.


True Spike Bull Restrictions:

Bull elk taken in these units must have both antlers with no branching originating more than four inches above where the antlers attach to the skull. Under the true spike restriction, the taking of an elk that has two points on one side or has antler points within one inch of the definitions regarding length of point, or point of origination is an infraction. All other types of violations of the true spike restriction are subject to current penalties and assessments.

Visible Antler:

A horn-like growth projecting above the hairline.

The use of hounds to hunt cougar is prohibited statewide except during public safety cougar removals or the commission authorized hunts (WACs 232-12-243 and 232-28-285) on the next page.

Mandatory Hide Sealing Requirements:

All successful cougar hunters must contact a WDFW office within 72 hours of killing a cougar to schedule a hide sealing appointment. Pelts must be sealed within 5 days of kill.

The skull and hide (both non-frozen) must be presented so that teeth and biological samples can be taken. Placing a stick or wedge in the cougar's mouth after harvesting it, aids in the removal of teeth. Ensure proof of sex is left attached to pelt. No one may possess an open WDFW cougar seal unless it has been cut by a licensed taxidermist or fur dealer who has received and invoiced the pelt for processing.

License/Tag Required:

A valid big game license, which includes cougar as a species option. One cougar transport tag is included with this license.

Bag Limit:

One cougar per license year, excluding public safety cougar removals. It is unlawful to kill or possess spotted cougar kittens (usually <80 lbs.) or adult cougars accompanied by spotted kittens. Since cougars are solitary, observing multiple tracks suggests a female with offspring. However, smaller kittens may not be visible to hunters so please observe and be patient before shooting.

Hunting Methods:

Hunters may use legal modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader equipment for hunting cougar as identified in the table. Cougar may also be hunted with a 22 caliber or larger centerfire rifle. Rimfire 22 caliber is illegal.

Application Submission Period:

April 26 through midnight on May 26, 2010

Bag Limit:

One cougar during the permit season, excluding public safety cougar removals. It is unlawful to kill or possess spotted cougar kittens or an adult cougar accompanied by spotted kittens.

Notification:

Individuals selected will be notified by mid-July. Permits may not be sold or reassigned by the hunter.

Cougar Permit Season:

Cougars may be hunted from December 1, 2010, until the female zone quota has been killed, the total zone quota has been killed, or March 31, 2011, whichever occurs first (EXCEPT the season opens January 1, 2011 in GMUs 101, 105, 204).

Pursuit-Only Season & Second Drawing:

If either the total or female zone quota is reached prior to March 31, 2011, cougar may be pursued with dogs in all or portions of that zone until March 31, 2011. Hunters selected for a kill permit may continue to participate in a pursuit-only season. In addition, if a quota is reached the Department may issue pursuit-only permits to additional hunters (hunters may not kill cougar during a pursuit-only season). If the quota is not reached in a hunt zone by February 15 or sooner, the Department may issue kill permits to additional hunters. During a second drawing for pursuit or kill permits, hunters will be drawn at random from the unselected pool

of applicants and must be a resident of one of the participating counties.

Kill Ouotas:

The cougar season uses a kill quota system, where hunters may hunt and kill cougar until the allotted numbers of cougar have been killed from each hunt zone or March 31, 2011, whichever occurs first. Kill quotas start September 1 and include all cougar killed during seasons with and without the aid of dogs, as well as depredation permits, landowner kill permits, and WDFW kills.

Dog Handlers:

If dogs are used, up to three dog handlers may accompany a permittee while hunting or pursuing cougar; "accompany" means that a person is engaged in hunting activities under this season and is only allowed when the permittee is simultaneously in the field, and such permittee is within the same open designated permit area.

Once dogs are in the act of tracking a cougar, the permit hunter and handler may separate, but work together while listening to locate the dog(s). However, the permit hunter and handler must be in the physical presence of each other if the handler is at a treed cougar. Transporting a dog(s) in a motorized vehicle or walking a dog on a leash is not pursuit.

Each permit hunter will be issued three dog handler ID cards and vehicle placards, and each dog handler must have these in their possession while participating in a cougar hunt.

Hunter Training:

Successful applicants must complete a training program prior to participating in a permit season with the aid of dogs. The training program is comprised of printed materials on cougar sex identification, species identification (i.e., lynx, bobcat, black bear, and grizzly bear), and hunt season rules. Individuals selected for a cougar permit must sign and return the affidavit indicating they read the materials.

Disqualifications:

A permit will not be issued to any person who has been convicted of unlawful use of dogs under RCW 77.15.245 within the five year period prior to December 1, 2004. Any person issued a permit who is subsequently convicted of any wildlife offense while participating in a pursuit-or-kill or pursuit-only season, or who violates any condition of the permit, will have the permit revoked and will be ineligible to participate in the remainder of the pilot program.

Mandatory Reporting:

All hunters must report their hunting activity (whether they harvest a cougar or not) using the toll-free quota hotline (1-866-364-4868). Hunters who harvest a cougar must notify the department within 24 hours of kill (excluding legal state holidays) and provide the hunter's name, Wild ID, date and Game Management Unit of kill, and sex of animal. Permit hunters who purchased a cougar transport, but did not hunt or harvest a cougar must report their cougar hunting activity by April 10, 2011.

The raw pelt of the cougar (with proof of sex naturally attached) must be sealed by an authorized department employee within five days of the notification of kill. Any person who takes a cougar must present the cougar skull in such a manner that teeth and biological samples can be extracted to an authorized department employee at the time of sealing. Call a Regional Office (see page 11) to make arrangements to have a cougar checked.

Quota Hotline 1-866-DOG-HUNT:

All cougar hunters must call the cougar quota hotline within 24 hours prior to each day hunting cougar to determine if the zone quota has been reached and the zone is closed.

Cougar Permit Season - Dogs Allowed

Quota Hotline & Reporting Requirements

Before Going Hunting

- Permit hunters must call the cougar quota hotline before going hunting to find out if the hunt zone is open or closed for killing a cougar.

After Going Hunting

- If a permit hunter kills a cougar, he or she must notify WDFW within 24 hours of the kill.
- Please call the quota hotline or any WDFW Regional office listed on page 11 to report a kill.
- Hunters also must present the cougar skull and pelt (with proof of sex naturally attached) to WDFW within 5 days
 of notification of kill for sealing.
- Present the skull and hide so that teeth and biological samples can be taken.
- Placing a stick or wedge in the cougar's mouth after harvesting it aids in the removal of teeth.

Commonly Asked Questions:

- Q. Do I have to own dogs to apply for a permit season where dogs are lawful to hunt cougar?
- A. No, starting in 2009 you do not have to own dogs to apply for a permit season where dogs are lawful to hunt cougar.
- Q. Can a dog handler pursue cougar?
- A. Yes, but the permit hunter must be in the physical presence of the handler when dogs are unleashed, unrestrained, or starting a cougar track. Once dogs are in the act of tracking a cougar, the permit hunter and handler may separate, but work together while listening to locate the dogs. However, the permit hunter must be in the physical presence of the handler at a treed cougar. A dog handler can walk a dog on a leash or transport a dog in a motorized vehicle when he/she is not in the physical presence of the permit hunter.
- Q. During a cougar permit hunt, can a designated dog handler harvest a cougar?
- A. No, only the permit hunter may harvest a cougar.
- Q. What is included in the training program for permit cougar hunts with the aid of dogs?
- A. The training program is comprised of printed materials on cougar sex identification, species identification (i.e., lynx, bobcat, black bear, and grizzly bear), and hunt season rules. Individuals selected for a cougar permit must sign and return an affidavit indicating they read the materials and own a dog capable of tracking and baying a cougar.

Anyone with a valid Washington Big Game License, which includes cougar as a species option.

Mandatory Hide Sealing Requirements:

All successful cougar hunters must contact a WDFW office within 72 hours of killing a cougar to schedule a hide sealing appointment. Pelts must be sealed within 5 days of kill.

The skull and hide (both non-frozen) must be presented so that teeth and biological samples can be taken. Placing a stick or wedge in the cougar's mouth after harvesting it, aids in the removal of teeth for biological sampling. Ensure proof of sex is left attached to pelt.

No one may possess an open WDFW cougar seal unless it has been cut by a licensed taxidermist or fur dealer who has received and invoiced the pelt for processing.

Fall Black Bear General Seasons

General Information

License Required:

A valid big game hunting license, which includes black bear as a species option.

Tag Information:

One black bear transport tag/license is included with a big game license that has black bear as a species option. A second black bear transport tag/license must be purchased to take a second bear. Hunters may purchase a maximum of two black bear transport tag/licenses.

Bag Limit:

Two black bear during the hunting season, only one of which may be taken in Eastern Washington.

Hunting Method:


Hunters may use any lawful big game modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader equipment for hunting black bear. The use of hounds and/or bait to hunt black bear is prohibited statewide.

Attention:

Hunters are urged to not shoot a sow with cubs. Sows may be accompanied by cubs in the Fall (30-50 lbs) that tend to lag behind when traveling, so please observe and be patient before shooting.

Submitting Bear Teeth

Successful black bear hunters must submit the black bear premolar tooth, which is located behind the canine tooth of the upper jaw. Tooth envelopes are available at all WDFW offices (see page 11).





Notes:

The Department recently completed a mountain goat research project throughout the Cascade Mountain range. We now have a better understanding about the size and location of mountain goat populations, intermixing between sub-populations and sustainable harvest levels for each. We are now applying that new information to our mountain goat harvest strategies by managing hunted mountain goat populations as a collection of smaller sub-populations, where nanny groups may be fairly distinct, but billies have a greater potential to intermix. Ideally, harvest will be well distributed throughout a population, so no sub-populations are over harvested.

As a precautionary step, the Director may open or close specific sub-populations, or reduce permit levels slightly, to protect from over harvest. Hunt Area maps are available online at http://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/game_species/goat_sheep_moose/index.html.



Night Hunting and Hound Hunting During Deer and Elk Hunting Seasons

Bobcat, raccoon, and coyote may be hunted at night during established bobcat and raccoon seasons, **EXCEPT** that it is unlawful to hunt any wildlife at night or wild animals with dogs (hounds) during the months of September, October, or November in any area open to a centerfire rifle deer or elk season. The use of hounds to hunt black bear, cougar, bobcat, or coyote is prohibited year round except during commission authorized hunts.

Wild Turkey Fall Seasons

General Wild Turkey Hunting Information:

- Hunters who harvested two birds in eastern Washington during the spring CAN participate in fall turkey seasons.
- Hunting hours for turkeys: one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.
- It is illegal to hunt turkeys with anything other than a shotgun (modern or muzzleloader), bow and arrow, or falconry.
- Turkey hunters are required to report their hunting activity for each tag purchased and for their special permit if drawn for one (see page 13).
- It is unlawful to use dogs, electronic calls, or electronic decoys to hunt turkey.
- Baiting game birds is illegal.
- Hunters must use #4 shot or smaller (e.g. #6 shot is legal) to hunt turkey.

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife has a procedure for reporting fish/wildlife violations. This encourages any citizen who witnesses a fish and wildlife offense, who has knowledge of a fish or wildlife offense, or has an encounter with dangerous wildlife, to report the violation/incident. Individuals who witness and would like to report a violation, can call toll-free 1-800-933-9847. Reports are confidential and are forwarded to a Fish and Wildlife Officer for investigation. Timeliness when reporting a violation is crucial.

Hunters who provide violator information leading to an arrest and conviction could be eligible for a cash reward or Hunter Bonus Points. Bonus Points give you a better chance for the special permit season drawings.

Violations and Penalties

License and Tag Violations

You may NOT:

- Buy, possess, or attempt to obtain any license, tag, or permit by using false information; or if your license, tag, etc... has been revoked or the privilege has been suspended.
- Purchase or possess more than one of each license or tag, permit, or stamp during the same year, unless it is a legally obtained duplicate or authorized by the Fish and Wildlife Commission.
- Transfer, loan to, or borrow from another person any license, tag, permit, or stamp.
- Purchase or possess a resident license from another state, if hunting as a resident in Washington State.

There is no excuse for careless firearms handling. There is no way to call back a bullet!

Common Violations

To avoid the most common violations:

- Have valid and appropriate licenses, tags, and permits on your person when you hunt.
- Don't have a loaded shotgun or rifle in or on a motor driven vehicle.
- Immediately and completely remove the tag notches that indicate the month and day the animal was killed.
- Immediately attach your appropriate tag to the animal you've killed.

Firearm Laws

Aliens and felons may not possess firearms (RCWs 9.41.040 and 9.41.170).

Loaded Firearms in a Vehicle

It is illegal to carry, convey, transport, possess, or control a loaded shotgun or rifle in or on any motor vehicle. A rifle or shotgun containing shells or cartridges in either the chamber or magazine, or a muzzleloading firearm that is loaded and capped or primed is considered loaded.

License Suspensions and Property Forfeiture

Washington State's Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Code (Revised Code of Washington Chapter 77.15) requires the mandatory suspension of a person's hunting privileges if a person is convicted of one of the following violations:

- Assaulting a Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Officer or an employee or agent of the Department performing official duties.
- Unlawful hunting of big game.
- First degree waste of fish and wildlife.
- Harvesting endangered fish or wildlife.
- Hunting big game with an artificial light or spotlight.
- Violating the prohibition on hunting bear with bait or the limitations on using dogs to hunt bear, cougar, bobcat, or lynx.
- Unlawfully purchasing or using a license.
- Committing a crime that involves a willful or wanton disregard for conservation of wildlife.
- Shooting another person or domestic livestock while hunting.

In addition, repeat offenders will receive a mandatory two-year suspension of all fishing and hunting privileges. A repeat offender is any person with two strikes within ten years for big game hunting violations and three strikes within ten years for all other recreational hunting and fishing violations. The law treats an uncontested notice of infraction, a bail forfeiture (payment of the fine on a citation), or a guilty plea as a conviction that will be counted.

You will permanently lose your fishing and hunting privileges if you hunt or fish on a suspended license or demonstrate a willful or wanton disregard for the conservation of fish or wildlife.

The privilege to hunt or fish in Washington will also be revoked if notice of a suspension is received from another state whose suspensions Washington has agreed to honor. Similarly, Washington will report the issuance of a suspension in this state to other states.

Property that is used to violate any fishing and hunting regulations, or that is held with the intention of committing a violation, may be seized for evidence and may ultimately be forfeited to the state.

Criminal Wildlife Penalty Assessment

In addition to criminal penalties, courts assess a criminal wildlife penalty for conviction of illegally killing or possessing: deer, elk, bear, or cougar - \$2,000; moose, antelope, bighorn sheep, mountain goat, or any endangered species - \$4,000; trophy deer (four or more antler points on both sides, not including eye guards), or elk (five or more antler points on both sides, not including eye guards) - \$6,000; and mountain caribou, grizzly bear, or trophy mountain sheep (3/4 curl or better) - \$12,000.

Unlawful Possession of Firearms

Washington State Law, RCW 9.41.040, states:

"A person, whether an adult or juvenile, is guilty of the crime of unlawful possession of a firearm in the first degree, if the person owns, has in his or her possession, or has in his or her control any firearm after having previously been convicted in this state or elsewhere of any serious offense as defined in this chapter." Have you previously been convicted in this state or elsewhere of a crime which may affect your privilege to carry a firearm? If you have been convicted of one of the offenses as defined in Chapter 9.41 RCW and are found in possession of a firearm while hunting you may be subject to arrest. If you are in doubt, seek appropriate legal counsel. Possession rights may in some cases be restored per Chapter 9.41 RCW.

Aiding and Assisting

It is unlawful to aid or assist anyone in the commission of a game law violation.

- 1. Do Not Trespass The state of Washington has strict laws prohibiting trespass on private land. Owners are not required to post their land.
- 2. Littering You may NOT place or leave litter on any land, either public or private, which is not your own.
- 3. Traps It is illegal to take a wild animal from another person's trap without permission or to damage, remove, or destroy a trap. Exception: A trap may be removed by the property owner.
- 4. **Driving Vehicles on WDFW Lands** You may NOT operate a motor-driven vehicle on lands owned, controlled, or managed by the WDFW, except as authorized. Off-road travel on Department lands is usually prohibited.

Equipment and Hunting Methods

Modern Firearm Regulations

Rifles:

Big game, except cougar, must be hunted with a minimum of 24 caliber (6mm) centerfire rifle. Cougar may be hunted with 22 caliber centerfire rifle. Rimfire rifles are not legal for big game.

Handguns:

Big game, except cougar, may be hunted with handguns with a minimum barrel length of 4 inches per manufacturers specification, and fire a minimum 24 caliber centerfire cartridge. Cougar may be hunted with 22 caliber centerfire handgun. Rimfire handguns are not legal for big game.

Shotauns:

Deer, bear, and cougar may be hunted with 20 gauge to 10 gauge shotguns shooting slugs or #1 or larger buckshot. Other big game may be hunted with a 10 or 12 gauge shotgun using slugs. Hunters must use #4 shot or smaller (e.g. #6 shot is legal) to hunt turkey.

Crossbows:

Crossbows may be used to hunt wildlife in firearm restriction areas. See page 75.

Muzzleloader Regulations

- 1. Definitions
 - Muzzleloader: A firearm that is loaded from the muzzle and uses black powder or a black powder substitute as recommended by the manufacturer for use in all muzzleloading firearms.
 - A muzzleloading firearm shall be considered loaded if a powder charge and a projectile, either shot or single projectile are in the barrel and the barrel or breech is capped or primed.
- It is unlawful to hunt wildlife using a muzzleloading firearm that does not meet the following specifications.
 - A muzzleloading shotgun or rifle must have a single or double barrel, rifled or smoothbored
 - A muzzleloading shotgun or rifle used for deer must be .40 caliber or larger.
 Buckshot size #1 or larger may be used in a smoothbore of .60 caliber or larger for deer.
 - A muzzleloading shotgun, rifle, or handgun used for all other big game must be .45 caliber or larger.
 - d. Persons lawfully hunting small game with a double barrel, muzzleloading shotgun may keep both barrels loaded.
 - e. A muzzleloading handgun must have a single or double barrel of at least eight inches, must be rifled, and must be capable of being loaded with forty-five grains or more of black powder or black

- powder substitute per the manufacturer's recommendations.
- f. A muzzleloading handgun used for big game must be .45 caliber or larger.
- g. A handgun designed to be used with black powder, including black powder percussion revolvers, can be used to hunt forest grouse, cottontail rabbits, and snowshoe hares.
- In addition to the above requirements, it is unlawful to participate (hunt) in a muzzleloading hunting season using a firearm that does not meet the following specifications for a muzzleloader. As in the past sabots are allowed. Any type of projectile is allowed.

A modern handgun may be carried for personal protection. Modern handguns cannot be used to hunt big game or dispatch wounded big game during a big game hunting season for muzzleloading firearms.

- a. Ignition is to be wheel lock, matchlock, flintlock, or percussion using original style percussion caps that fit on the nipple and are exposed to the weather. "Exposed to the weather" means the percussion cap or the frizzen must be visible and not capable of being enclosed by an integral part of the weapon proper. Primers designed to be used in modern cartridges are not legal.
- Sights must be open, peep, or of other open sight design. Fiber optic sights are legal.
 Telescopic sights or sights containing glass are prohibited.
- It is unlawful to have any electrical device or equipment attached to a muzzleloading firearm while hunting.
- Those persons lawfully hunting big game with a double barrel muzzleloader may only keep one barrel loaded.
- 4. Hunters with disabilities who meet the definition of being visually impaired in WAC 232-12-828 may receive a special use permit that would allow the use of scopes or other visual aids. A disabled hunter permit holder in possession of a special use permit that allows the use of a scope or visual aid may hunt game birds or game animals during muzzleloader seasons. Contact the Department's ADA coordinator for further information.
- Muzzleloading firearms used during a modern firearm season are not required to meet ignition, sight, or double barrel restrictions.

Archery Regulations

- 1. Rules pertaining to all archery:
 - a. It is unlawful for any person to carry or have in his possession any firearm while in the field archery hunting, during an archery season specified for that area, except for modern handguns carried for personal protection. Modern handguns cannot be used to hunt big game or dispatch wounded big game during an archery, big game hunting season.
 - b. It is unlawful to have any electrical equipment or electric device(s) attached to the bow or arrow while hunting.
 - c. It is unlawful to shoot a bow and arrow from a vehicle or from, across or along the maintained portion of a public highway, except that persons with a disabled hunter permit may shoot from a vehicle if the hunter is in compliance with WAC 232-12-828.
 - d. It is unlawful to use any device secured to or supported by the bow for the purpose of maintaining the bow at full draw or in a firing position, except that persons with an archery special use permit may hunt game birds or game animals using a device that stabilizes and holds a long bow, recurve bow, or compound bow at a full draw, and may use a mechanical or electrical release.
 - It is unlawful to hunt wildlife with a crossbow. However, disabled hunter permittees in possession of a crossbow special use permit may hunt with a crossbow in any season that allows archery equipment.
 - f. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow or bolt that does not have a sharp broadhead, and the broadhead blade or blades are less than seven-eighths inch wide.
 - g. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with a broadhead blade unless the broadhead is unbarbed and completely closed at the back end of the blade or blades by a smooth, unbroken surface starting at maximum blade width and forming a smooth line toward the feather end of the shaft and such line does not angle toward the point.
 - h. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with a retractable braodhead.
 - It is unlawful to hunt wildlife with any bow or crossbow equipped with a scope. However, hunters with disabilities who meet the definition of being visually impaired in WAC 232-12-828 may receive a special use

permit that would allow the use of scopes or other visual aids. A disabled hunter permit holder in possession of a special use permit that allows the use of a scope or visual aid may hunt game birds or game animals during archery seasons.

- 2. Rules pertaining to long bow, recurve bow: and compound bow archery:
 - a. It is unlawful for any person to hunt big game animals with a bow that does not produce a minimum of 40 pounds of pull measured at twenty-eight inches or less draw length.
 - b. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow measuring less than 20 inches in length or weighing less than 6 grains per pound of draw weight with a minimum arrow weight of 300 grains.
- 3. Rules pertaining to crossbows:
 - a. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with a crossbow with a draw weight less than 125 pounds, a limb width less than 24 inches, a draw length less than 14 inches, and a trigger safety that does not work properly.
 - It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow or bolt measuring less than 16 inches in length and weighing less than 350 grains.
 - It is unlawful to hunt game animals or game birds with a crossbow that weighs more than 15 pounds.
 - d. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow or bolt that does not have a


- sharp broadhead and the broadhead blade or blades are less than seven-eighths inch wide.
- e. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with a broadhead blade unless the broadhead is unbarbed and completely closed at the back end of the blade or blades by a smooth, unbroken surface starting at maximum blade width and forming a smooth line toward the feather end of the shaft, and such line does not angle toward the point.
- f. It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with a retractable broadhead.
- 4. Archery special use permits:
 - a. An archery special use permit is available to a person who possesses a valid disabled hunter permit. An archery special use permit application must be signed by a physician stating that the person's disability is permanent and the person has a loss of use of one or both upper extremities, has a significant limitation in the use of an upper extremity, or has a permanent physical limitation, which loss or limitation substantially impairs the ability to safely hold, grasp, or shoot a long bow, recurve bow or compound bow. The loss or limitation may be the result of, but not limited to, amputation, paralysis, diagnosed disease, or birth defect. The approved archery special use permit must be in the physical possession of the person while using adaptive archery equipment as described in subsection 1.d. to hunt game birds or game animals.
- b. A crossbow special use permit is available to a person who meets the requirements for an archery special use permit and is unable to use adaptive archery equipment. Adaptive equipment includes, but is not limited to: Cocking devices that hold the bow at full draw: trigger mechanisms that may be released by mouth, or chin, or hand supporting the bow; and devices that assist in supporting the bow. Information describing types of adaptive equipment will be provided to physicians for their assessment of the applicant's ability to utilize adaptive archery equipment. Muscle weakness, impaired range of motion, or unilateral hand weakness disability, of both hands or both arms or both sides of the upper extremity, may result in an inability to use adaptive archery equipment. Standard tests approved by the American Medical Association may be conducted to assess a person's abilities.

Dispatching Wounded Game

A hunter can only use a hunting method that meets the equipment requirements of his/her tag to dispatch wounded game.

Loaded Firearms in a Vehicle

It is illegal to carry, convey, transport, possess, or control a loaded shotgun or rifle in or on any motor vehicle (except under WAC 232-12-828). A rifle or shotgun containing shells or cartridges in either the chamber or magazine, or a muzzleloading firearm that is loaded and capped or primed is considered loaded.



HELP STOP POACHING

Every year poachers steal hunting opportunities and hundreds of animals from the citizens of Washington. You can help protect our resources by reporting violations. The Turn In a Poacher (TIP) program provides the public the opportunity to confidentially report fish and wildlife violations. A person who provides information that leads to an arrest may be eligible for a cash reward or bonus points.

Prohibited Hunting Methods

1. Hunting with artificial lights:

Hunting big game with the aid of an artificial light or spotlight is prohibited.

Shooting at wild animals or wild birds while they are on any utility line, pole, its crossarm or insulator is prohibited.

3. Using aircraft:

It is illegal to:

- Use an aircraft to spot, locate, or report the location of wildlife for the purpose of hunting.
- Hunt big game on the same day you were airborne for any purpose, except for a regularly scheduled commercial flight.
- Hunting wildlife from a motor vehicle is prohibited, exceptions: see Persons with Disabilities on page 84.

Aircraft, boats, or motor driven vehicles:

Using aircraft, boats, or motor driven vehicles to pursue, concentrate, or harass wildlife is prohibited. This includes ATVs. Hunting from boats with motors is permitted if the motor is off and it is not contributing to the boat's propulsion.

6. Discharging a firearm from, across, or along the maintained portion of any public highway, regardless of surface, is prohibited, except for hunters with disabilities in compliance with WAC 232-12-828.

7. Party hunting:

Party hunting is defined as shooting at or killing big game or turkeys for another, killing big game or turkeys with the intention of having another person tag the animal; or tagging a big game animal or turkey that another person has killed.

Party hunting is illegal for big game and turkey, except for hunters with disabilities who have a designated hunting companion as defined in WAC 232-12-828.

8. Failure to tag properly:

It is illegal to use another hunter's tag for an animal you have killed. It is illegal for another hunter to use your tag on an animal they have killed (except under WAC 232-12-828).

9. Using dogs:

- Hunting wild animals with dogs during any deer or elk modern firearm season is prohibited.
- Allowing a dog, owned or controlled by you, to pursue or injure deer or elk or to accompany you while you are hunting deer or elk is prohibited.
- Hunting or pursuing any big game animal, bobcat, or coyote with dogs is prohibited, except cougar hunting as permitted by the Fish and Wildlife Commission.

10. Hunting during modern firearm deer or elk seasons:

You may not hunt wildlife during any modern firearm deer or elk season, with any firearm 24 caliber or larger or containing slugs or buckshot for big game, unless you have a valid license, permit and tag for one of the following: deer, elk, black bear, cougar, mountain goat, bighorn sheep, or moose.

During any modern firearm deer or elk season, it is illegal to hunt any wildlife after legal hunting hours. See exceptions to legal big game hunting hours on page 68.

11. Prohibited firearms/hunting methods

It is illegal to:

- Hunt game birds with a shotgun capable of holding more than three shells.
- Hunt game birds with a rifle or pistol, except forest grouse.
- Hunt game birds or game animals with anything other than a firearm, a bow and arrow, or by falconry. Bullfrogs may only be taken by angling, hand dip netting, gigging, and bow and arrow.
- Hunt game animals or game birds with a shotgun larger than 10 gauge.
- Hunt wildlife with a crossbow, except in firearm restriction areas. However, disabled hunter permittees in possession of a crossbow special use permit may hunt with a crossbow in any season that allows archery equipment.
- Hunt wildlife with a fully automatic firearm.

12. Using night vision and laser sights:

It is illegal to hunt deer or elk with the aid of infrared night vision equipment or with laser sights (not to include range finders) capable of projecting a beam onto the target, while in possession or control of a firearm, bow and arrow, or crossbow.

13. Using decoys and calls:

It is illegal to hunt waterfowl, turkey, or deer with the use or aid of electronic calls and battery powered or other electronic devices as decoys.

14. Radio-telemetry equipment:

It is illegal to use radio-telemetry equipment to locate and hunt wildlife with transmitters attached to them.

Tagging and Transporting Game

1. Tag Your Big Game Immediately:

Immediately after any big game animal has been killed, the appropriate tag of the person who has taken the animal must be:

- Validated: Cut out and completely remove the month and day of kill. Month and day must be completely removed. A slit is not acceptable.
- 2. Securely attached to the carcass in a visible manner.

2. Transporting Wildlife:

You must transport any big game animal with the proper tag attached. The properly validated tag must remain with the meat until it is eaten (including cold storage).

If quartered, the tag should remain with the carcass or largest portion of the carcass. If you need to take the head to a taxidermist and the meat to be processed, you can complete a taxidermy ledger or invoice, providing information outlined under "Possession and Use of Wildlife" for the taxidermist, and keep the tag with the meat at the processor.

The tag should remain attached to the hide of a bear or cougar until it is tanned.

3. Evidence of Animal's Sex:

It is illegal to possess or transport big game animals unless evidence of the animal's sex is left naturally attached to the carcass until the carcass is processed or stored for consumption. Evidence of sex means:

Male - head with antlers or horns attached or penis or testes naturally attached to at least one quarter of the carcass or to the largest portion of meat.

Female - the head or udder must be naturally attached to at least one quarter of the carcass or to the largest portion of meat.

Big game taken in antler or horn restriction areas: The head or skull plate, with both horns or both antlers naturally attached, must accompany the carcass while in transit or in possession.

The feathered heads of game birds must be attached to the carcass when they are in your possession in the field or are being transported.

Possession and Use of Wildlife:

1. Transporting Game or Portions of Meat Taken by Somebody Else:

If you transport or possess wildlife (or parts) killed by someone else, you must possess a written statement showing the name, address, license, permit or tag number; the number and kind of animal provided, the date killed, county,

and area it was taken in, and the hunter's signature.

2. Waste of Wildlife: You may NOT allow game animals or game birds you have taken to recklessly be wasted.

3. Purchasing or Selling Wildlife or Their Parts:

Non-edible portions of wild animals and game birds may be sold or traded (antlers, hides, teeth), except for bighorn sheep; mountain goat; velvet antlers of deer or elk; or the gall bladder, claws, and teeth of bear, except those claws or teeth permanently attached to a full bear skin or mounted bear or the raw fur of a wild animal or the wild animal itself, if the wild animal, has been trapped in this state with a body gripping trap.

4. Wildlife Found Dead:

You may remove and dispose of wildlife found dead on your property or an adjoining public roadway, but you must first notify WDFW. Dead wildlife can only be removed for disposal, not for personal use or consumption.

(WAC 246.203.121)

5. Possession of Antlers:

It is legal to possess naturally shed antlers of deer, elk, and moose.

6. Stolen Wildlife:

Lawfully-tagged wildlife is personal property. Theft of wildlife should be reported to WDFW Enforcement or local law enforcement.

7. Depredating Wildlife:

Rock doves (pigeons), Eurasian collared doves, starlings, and house sparrows may be taken at any time. Crows may be taken during the crow season or in the act of depredation. Crow season: Statewide, no limit, October 1 - January 31. Magpies may be taken only in the act of depredation (damaging crops or other property).

8. Endangered Species:

It is illegal to hunt, possess, or control protected wildlife or endangered species. Endangered species are: pygmy rabbit; fisher; gray wolf;

Be sure of identification if you are hunting coyotes.

Wolves are back in Washington. They are protected under both federal and state law and may not be shot or killed.





grizzly bear; sea otter; sei, fin, blue, humpback, black right, kille (orca) and sperm whales; Columbian white-tailed deer; woodland caribou; American white and brown pelicans; sandhill crane; snowy plover; upland sandpiper; Northern spotted owl; western pond and leatherback sea turtles; mardon skipper, Taylor's checkerspot, and Oregon silverspot butterflies; and Oregon spotted and northern leopard frogs.

9. Protected Wildlife:

It is illegal to hunt, kill, possess, or control protected wildlife. Protected wildlife are: Cascade golden-mantled ground, golden mantled ground, Washington ground, red, Douglas, northern flying and western gray squirrels; Mazama pocket gopher, steller and California sea lions; seals; dolphins; porpoises; whales, green sea, loggerhead sea and painted turtles; Larch Mountain salamanders; pygmy whitefish, margined sculpins; Olympic mudminnows; cony or pika; North American lynx; common loon; least, yellow-pine, Townsend's, and red-tailed chipmunks; hoary and Olympic marmots; wolverines; California mountain kingsnakes; all birds not classified as game birds, except, starlings, house sparrows, rock doves (pigeons) and magpies; all bats, except when found in or immediately adjacent to a dwelling or other occupied building.

Hunting Access and Closures

Military Installations

Hunting is allowed on some military lands, but these areas usually require permission or a permit from military authorities. Hunters should check with the military installation before entering these lands.

State Lands

Most state lands are open to hunting unless they are closed by state, local, or municipal laws. State parks are closed to hunting and trapping.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Refuge Lands

Hunting is allowed on most National Wildlife Refuges with specific restrictions applying to species, bag limits, season dates, access permits, and legal weapons. Hunters should contact the refuge directly to obtain information before hunting on National Wildlife Refuge lands. Information about National Wildlife Refuges is available online at www.fws.gov/refuges/refugeLocatorMaps/Washington.html.

Private Lands

It is unlawful to trespass. State hunting regulations apply to hunting private land, but do not guarantee access. Entry onto any lands which are fenced, posted, cultivated, or used for commercial agricultural crops or aquaculture without permission is considered trespass. Some private landowners (individuals or corporations) have chosen to deny access to, or across, their property. Check with landowners before entering their property. It is always best to obtain landowner permission before entering private property.

It is unlawful to:

- Hunt in areas posted with Hunting Only by Written Permission without a permission card signed by the landowner on your person.
- Hunt or shoot behind a Safety Zone sign.
- Operate a motor vehicle (including ORVs) behind a No Unauthorized Vehicles sign unless specifically authorized by the landowner under the Regulated Access Cooperative Agreement with the WDFW.

Some private lands may be open weekends only.

Restricted and Prohibited Hunting Areas

These areas are closed by Fish and Wildlife Commission action. Other areas may be closed to hunting by local, state, or federal regulations.

It is illegal to hunt, except where provided, in the following areas:

Parker Lake (GMU 117) (Pend Oreille Co.):
All lands S. of Ruby Creek Rd. (USFS Rd. 2489),
N. of Tacoma Creek Rd. (USFS Rd. 2389) and W.
of Bonneville Power Administration powerlines are
designated as "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of
wild animals and wild birds year around. The Parker
Lake closure was established to provide a protected
area for the Air Force Military Survival Training
Program.

Columbia River and all the islands in the river, and the Benton County shoreline below the high water mark, and any peninsula originating on the Benton County shoreline, between Vernita Bridge (Hwy. 24) downstream to the old Hanford townsite powerline crossing (wooden towers) in Sec. 24, T 13 N, R 27 E, is designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of wild animals and wild birds.

Green River (GMU 485) (King Co.):

Except for GMU 485 permit hunters, who may also take a black bear and/or cougar with the appropriate license/tag options, all lands within GMU 485 are designated as a CLOSED AREA to the hunting of wildlife by WDFW regulated hunters. The City of Tacoma enforces trespass within GMU 485 on lands owned or controlled by the City during all times of the year.

McNeil Island (Pierce Co.):

McNeil Island (part of GMU 652) is closed to hunting year around.

Loo-wit (GMU 522):

Closed to hunting and trapping within GMU 522 (Loo-wit), except for the hunting of elk by special permit holders during established seasons and designated areas.

Voice of America Dungeness Recreation Area County Park in Clallam County

Closed to all hunting except Wednesdays, weekends, and holidays, from the first weekend in October to the end of January.

Big Game Closures

Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, and Wahkiakum counties:

Closed to Columbian white-tailed deer hunting.

Cathlamet (within GMUs 506 & 530):

Beginning in the town of Skamokawa; E on SR 4 to Risk Rd; S and E on Risk Rd to Foster Rd; S on Foster Rd to Elochoman River; upstream along Elochoman River to Elochoman Valley Rd (old SR 407); W on Elochoman Valley Rd to SR 4; E on SR 4 to SR 409; S on SR 409 to Cathlamet Channel of Columbia River; E along N shore of Cathlamet Channel to Cape Horn; S in Columbia River to the state line; W along the state line to a point directly S of the mouth of Skamokawa Creek; N on Skamokawa Creek to SR 4 and point of beginning. This area is closed to deer and elk hunting to protect the Columbian white-tailed deer except by special permit.

Colville Indian Reservation:

The taking or hunting of big game or grouse within the Colville Indian Reservation boundaries is prohibited. The trapping of furbearers within the Colville Indian Reservation boundaries is prohibited.

Cottonwood and Howard Islands in GMU 564: Closed to all deer hunting.

Westport:

Closed to hunting of all big game animals on that part of Westport Peninsula lying N of State Hwy 105 from the west end of the Elk River Bridge and Schafer Island Road to the ocean beach.

Willapa National Wildlife Refuge:

Except for Long Island, Willapa National Wildlife Refuge is closed to all big game hunting.

Walla Walla Mill Creek Watershed (GMU 157):

All lands in the Mill Creek Watershed are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of all wild animals and wild birds except for holders of special elk permits during the established open season. This area is closed to motorized vehicles. Entry shall be allowed only by Forest Service Permit for the duration of the hunt. Any entry into the Mill Creek Watershed at other times is prohibited.

Firearm Restrictions

Firearm Restriction Areas

It is unlawful to hunt wildlife in the following firearm restriction areas with centerfire or rimfire rifles, or to fail to comply with additional firearm restrictions, except as established below.

In firearm restriction areas, hunters may hunt only during the season allowed by their tag.

- Archery tag holders may only hunt during archery seasons with archery equipment.
- Muzzleloader tag holders may only hunt during muzzleloader seasons with muzzleloader equipment.
- Modern firearm tag holders may hunt during modern firearm seasons with bows and arrows, crossbows, muzzleloaders, revolver-type handguns meeting equipment restrictions, or legal shotguns firing slugs or buckshot.

Firearm Restriction Areas by County:

NOTE - Other firearm restriction areas are established by local ordinance. Consult your local sheriff or city for other firearm restriction areas.

Chelan

That portion of GMU 251 (Mission) beginning at the intersection of the Duncan Road and Highway 2; S on Duncan Road to Mountain Home Road; S along Mountain Home Road to the Icicle Irrigation Ditch; S and W along the Icicle Irrigation Ditch to the Snow Lake Trail; W and N along the Snow Lake Trail and across the Icicle River to Icicle River Road; E and N along Icicle River Road to the Wenatchee River; NW along the Wenatchee River to Highway 2; N and E on Highway 2 to Duncan Road and the point of beginning.

Clallam

The portion of GMU 624 (Coyle) within Clallam County.

Clark

That portion GMU 554 (Yale in Clark Co.)

Clark

GMU 564 (Battle Ground).

Cowlitz

GMU 554 (Yale); GMU 504 (Stella). That portion of GMU 564 (Battle Ground) in Cowlitz Co.

Gravs Harbor

That portion of GMU 658 (North River) beginning at Bay City; then west along Highway 105 to Twin Harbors State Park; then south along Highway 105 to Grayland Grocery; then east on Cranberry Road to Turkey Road; then east and north on Turkey Rd to Bayview Logging Road; then north and east along Bayview Logging Road to Mallard Slough; then east and south along the Bayview Road to Andrews Creek; then north along main channel of Andrews Creek to Grays Harbor; then north and west along the main navigation channel to Bay City and point of beginning.

Grays Harbor Elk Area 6066

The following Chehalis Valley restriction applies only during elk seasons: That portion of GMU 660 (Minot Peak) described as follows: Beginning at Highway 12 and Highway 107 junction near Montesano; east and south on Highway 12 to Oakville; south on the Oakville-Brooklyn Road to a point one mile west of South Bank Road; northwest along a line one mile southwest of the South Bank Road to Delzene Road; north along Delzene Road to South Bank Road; northwest along South Bank Road to Wakefield Road; north on Wakefield Road to the Chehalis River; west along the Chehalis River to Highway 107 bridge; north on Highway 107 to Highway 12 to the point of beginning.

Island

The portion of GMU 410 (Island) on Camano and Whidbey islands.

Teffersor

Indian and Marrowstone islands.

King

The area W of Hwy 203 (Monroe-Fall City), then Fall City-Preston Rd to I-90, I-90 to Hwy 18, Hwy 18 to I-5, I-5 to Pierce-King Co. line; Vashon and Maury islands.

King

This area restricted to archery only. The following portion of GMU 652 (Puyallup): Beginning at the intersection of Hwy 410 and southeast Mud Mountain Dam Rd near the King-Pierce Co. line N of Buckley; E on southeast Mud Mountain Rd to 284th Ave SE; N on 284th Ave SE to Hwy 410; W on Hwy 410 to point of beginning.

Kitsap

E of Hwy 16 originating at the Tacoma Narrows Bridge to Gorst, and E of Hwy 3 to Newbury Hill Rd, N of Newbury Hill Rd and Bremerton-Seabeck Hwy to Big Beef Creek Bridge; all of Bainbridge Island; and Bangor Military Reservation.

Kittitas

GMU 334 (Ellensburg) Closed to centerfire rifles during deer and elk seasons.

Klickitat

Elk Area 5062 (Trout Lake) closed to centerfire rifles, handguns, and muzzleloaders October 1 to December 15.

Mason

GMU 633 (Mason Lake) S of Hammersley Inlet; and all of Hartstene Island.

Pacific

GMU 684 (Long Beach) W of Sand Ridge Rd. The portion of GMU 658 (North River) south and west of State Hwy 105 and Airport Rd between Raymond and North River Bridge. GMU 681 between U.S. Highway 101, Chinook Valley Road and the Columbia River from Astoria - Megler bridge to the Wallacut River.

Pierce

GMU 652 (Anderson and Ketron islands) limited to archery, shotgun, and muzzleloader. McNeil Island closed to hunting. See GMU 652 restriction area outlined for King County. GMU 627 (Kitsap) S of Hwy 302 on Longbranch Peninsula is a firearm restriction area.

San Juan

All San Juan County.

Snohomish

All areas west of Highway 9, until the intersection of Highway 9 and Highway 2, then east along Highway 2 to Highway 203, then all areas west of Highway 203 to the Snohomish/King County line.

Skagit

All mainland areas and islands in Skagit County west of I-5 and north of the Skagit/Snohomish County line, except Cypress Island. This restriction applies to big game hunting only.

Skamania

That portion of GMU 564 (Battle Ground in Skamania Co.)

Thurston

GMU 666 (Deschutes) N of U.S. Hwy 101 and I-5 between Oyster Bay and the mouth of Nisqually River.

Whatcom

All mainland areas and islands of Whatcom County that are west of I-5. This restriction applies to big game hunting only.

- * Elk multi-season permit holders may hunt eastern and western Washington.
- ★ Bag limit is any legal deer or elk consistent with the game management unit or area restrictions.
- ★ To apply you must purchase an application at a license dealership, online at fishhunt.dfw.wa.gov, or by calling 1-866-246-9453.
- If you are applying as an individual your application is automatically submitted. If you would like to apply as a group (maximum of 2 people), you must submit your application online at <u>fishhunt.dfw.wa.gov</u> or by calling 1-877-945-3492. - ★ Drawing results will be available online in April and winners will be notified by mail.

Proceeds from the sale of single-species raffle tickets will be used for the management and benefit of that species. Proceeds from the sale of multiple-species raffle tickets will be used for general game management.

There is no limit on the number of tickets a person may purchase. Residents and non-residents are eligible to purchase tickets. Refunds are not available on raffle ticket purchases. The "Once in a Lifetime Harvest" restriction is waived for auction and raffle hunts. The winner of the deer and elk raffles may purchase an additional deer or elk license/tag for the general hunting season if they

choose. If selected, any legal weapon may be used during the hunt.

One winner and two alternates will be drawn for each hunt. Each winner must be eligible to purchase a hunting license and will be issued the appropriate license and tag at no cost.

The drawing is done by computer and the winning ticket holder will be notified via phone and mail by mid-August. If you are selected for a multi-species raffle, a decision must be made as to which species you would like to hunt before your hunting license and tags will be issued by the Department.

Special Hunting Permit Drawing Changes

Special Hunting Permit Drawing System Changes for 2010

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) has made changes to the way random drawings are conducted for special-hunt permits. These changes will take effect for the drawing this year.

Wildlife staff first briefed the Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission on the proposal during a public meeting in March 2009. Since then, we modified the computerized drawing system in preparation for permit application sales this April. The Commission held a public hearing and took public comments at their March 11-12, 2010, meeting and adopted the final proposals at the April 9-10, 2010, meeting.

Why did WDFW make changes to the special hunt permitting system?

Because of the conditions and restrictions associated with various hunt choices, hunters have expressed dissatisfaction with the previous system. For example, many hunters surveyed said they would like to apply for antlerless permits, but didn't want to lose the points they are saving for popular buck and bull permits.

These concerns have merit. Under the previous system, all applications for special deer permits

were randomly drawn from the same pool, each weighted according to the number of points the applicant had accumulated from past drawings. The computer calculated these points and registered the hunter's preferences, but ultimately drew successful applications for all special deer hunts from the same pool. The same is true, under the previous system, for elk permits.

How has the system changed?

To address these issues, WDFW is now requiring separate applications for specific categories of deer, elk, bighorn sheep, moose, and cougar permits. Specifically, hunters may purchase and submit separate applications for a variety of categories, to include permits for: bucks or bulls, antlerless, second tags, quality hunts, youth hunts, senior hunts, disabled hunter hunts, and hunts for master hunters. WDFW will then conduct a separate drawing for each category.

Department managers are hopeful these improvements will result in greater customer satisfaction and increase applications for special hunting permits. The additional revenue is intended for use in increasing hunter access to private property.

What happens to the points I have accumulated in past drawings?

You will retain the points you accrued in past years. To ensure fairness, the number of points you had were applied to each new category. For example, if you currently have 3 deer points, you were credited 3 points in each of the eight deer categories (e.g. buck, second antlerless, quality).

Do I lose all of my deer points if I am drawn for one of the deer categories?

No, you will accrue and lose points within an individual category. For example, if you are drawn for an antlerless permit, you would lose your points in the antlerless category, but retain them in all other deer categories.

What happens if I draw more than one permit for the same species?

Unless one of those permits is for a second tag, you are restricted to harvesting one animal. If you draw more than one permit you can participate in each hunt, but would have to stop hunting once you harvest an animal.

Special Permit Application Instructions

General Information:

Special hunt permit applications are available for deer, elk, mountain goat, bighorn sheep, moose, wild turkey, cougar, and black bear.

A weighted-point permit drawing system is used, which gives applicants who have failed to be selected in the past a better chance to be awarded a permit in the future. It is based on the application history of each applicant.

Each year, those who are not selected for a permit earn a point. The purchase of an application will result in one accrued point for the category purchased. Points accumulate in each species category. When a hunter is selected, the hunter's point total for that category drops to zero. Everyone has a chance to be selected, but those with more points have a better chance of being awarded a permit.

Application Submission Periods:

Deer, Elk, Mountain Goat, Moose, Bighorn Sheep, Turkey, and Cougar:

April 26 through midnight on May 26, 2010

Spring bear:

January 3 through midnight on **March 10, 2011**.

Special hunt permit applications are not accepted after these deadlines.

Cost to Apply:

The cost for a special permit application is \$6.50 for residents, \$60.50 for non-residents, and \$4.10 for youth.

How to Apply:

1. Read...

Read the Big Game Hunting Seasons and Regulations to see what hunt choices are available. **Note:** permit hunts and hunt choice numbers change every year. Be sure you are reading the current year's hunting pamphlet when submitting your application(s).

2. Purchase Hunting License...

Purchase the required hunting license and select the appropriate transport tag(s).

For deer and elk, the transport tag must match the tag specified for the hunt listed in the special hunt tables. You must select your transport tag, including weapon type and location, before you can purchase a special permit application.

Applicants for turkey special hunt permits must have a valid small game hunting license before an application can be submitted.

Hunting licenses for mountain goat, moose, or bighorn sheep do not have to be purchased unless

you are selected for a special hunt permit. If selected, you must send a check or money order for the appropriate fee, to WDFW's Olympia office by the deadline established by the Department (15 day minimum) or the permit will become VOID and will be offered to an alternate.

You may also purchase using a credit card by calling 1-866-246-9453. If a youth is awarded a youth permit and turns 16 before purchasing the hunting license and tag, the full resident or non-resident price will be charged. No refunds or exchanges will be made for those purchasing a hunting license for mountain goat, moose, or bighorn sheep.

3. Purchase Permit Application...

See the table on the next page for information about each permit category available. Decide on and purchase special hunt application(s) for each category you would like to apply for.

There are three ways to purchase application(s):

- 3) Online: fishhunt.dfw.wa.gov

4. Decide if Applying as an Individual or Group...

Decide if you want to apply as an individual, as the leader of a group, or as a member of a group. If you want to apply as a member of a group, you must choose a group leader. The leader of the group must submit his or her application **before** members of the group can submit their applications.

When applying as a group, each member must be eligible for the hunts that the group is applying for. If a group application is selected for permits, all of the hunters in the group receive a permit and each hunter can take an animal. The points accumulated by each hunter in the group are averaged and applied to the group application.

If the number of permits available in a hunt category is less than the maximum group size, then the maximum group size is equal to the number of permits.

The maximum group sizes for each species category are as follows:

- 8 Deer & Elk
- 2 Bear & Cougar
- 2 Goat, Moose, & Bighorn Sheep
- 4 Turkey
- 2 Multi-season Deer & Elk

5. Decide on Hunt(s)...

Decide which hunts you would like to apply for, and in what order.

Multiple Hunt Choices — You can apply for a maximum of four hunt choices per application, except for the quality deer and elk categories. For quality deer and elk applications only two hunt choices are allowed. You do not have to apply for more than one hunt. If more than one hunt choice is requested, each hunt will be considered in the drawing in order of the priority you chose.

6. Submit...

Submit your application(s) online at **fishhunt**. **dfw.wa.gov/wdfw/special_permits.html** or by calling (24/7) toll-free **1-877-945-3492**.

Note: There is no other way to submit an application. Paper documents, phone calls, or email requests are not accepted.

When submitting, you will be asked to provide your WILD ID, name, and birth date. Your WILD ID is printed on each license or transport tag you purchase, and your sales receipts. This is your permanent identification number.

Next, choose a species category for which you would like to submit an application. The license system will only accept application submissions for species categories that you have already purchased a special hunt permit application.

For Individual Applications:

- 1) Enter your hunt choices
- Review them for accuracy
- Submit your application
- 4) Write down the confirmation number.

For Group Applications:

Leaders must apply first:

- 1) Choose a pass code*
- 2) Write it down for later reference
- 3) Enter your hunt choices
- 4) Review your choices for accuracy
- Submit your application
- 6) Write down the confirmation number
- 7) Provide your WILD ID number and pass code* to the member(s) of your group

Member(s) must apply second:

- Enter the group leader's WILD ID number and the pass code*
- 2) Submit your application.

You will NOT be asked to provide hunt choice numbers. The group leader already submitted the group's hunt choices.

*Pass codes are optional – A pass code is useful for a group application. It is a four-digit number

(used like a PIN). Your pass code ensures that others are prevented from inadvertently becoming part of your group.

Submit for points without getting drawn (Ghost Hunt Numbers):

If you want to continue to build points, but want to make sure you do not get selected for a permit, use the "ghost hunt choice numbers" listed below when submitting your application(s).

Supporting hunting licenses and transport tags must still be purchased before purchasing applications (except for goat, sheep, and moose) and the applications must be submitted by the deadline.

7. Write...

Write down or print the confirmation number you are provided after submitting your application(s).

If you are not issued a confirmation number, your application was NOT submitted and you must try again until one is issued.

8. Results...

Drawing results will be available online by the end of June for deer, elk, mountain goat, bighorn sheep, moose, cougar, and turkey. Notification postcards will be sent via mail by the middle of July. For spring bear you will receive notice by the end of March.

If you are selected for more than one permit you may participate in each hunt; however you must stop hunting once an animal is harvested (unless one of those permits is for a second deer tag).

NOTICE: This year's drawing will be the last year that all hunters who submit special permit applications will receive notice of the results in the mail. Starting in 2011, results will be available on the Internet only. Be sure to update your email address when you purchase your hunting license to ensure you receive future communications regarding special permits.

Background

License Plate!!!





There are five new license plate designs available from the Department of Licensing (DOL). These license plates are available for cars, trucks, motorcycles, and trailers. Each license plate(s) purchase will cost \$40 in addition to regular vehicle licensing fees, and \$30 in conjunction with your vehicle renewal fee. A total of \$28 from the sale of each plate purchase will be deposited into the State Wildlife Fund and will be spent on the following:

Deer, Elk, and Bear Plates Support:

Habitat improvements, population enhancements, and improved population monitoring for game animals.

Eagle Plates Support:

Working with communities and organizations to develop or improve watchable wildlife opportunities.

Orca Plates Support:

Endangered species population and habitat restoration and recovery.

To find information on ordering your plate(s), contact your local vehicle licensing office. To locate your local licensing office please visit the following website: https://fortress.wa.gov/dol/dolprod/vehoffices

You can change your existing plate to one of the new special designs anytime, however, the DOL highly recommends that you renew you vehicle registration at the same time you purchase your new special license plate. When you renew your vehicle registration, you will be required to pay an additional \$30.00 for the special plate renewal every year with your vehicle renewal.



Public Conduct Rules on WDFW Lands

The Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission adopted new rules (Washington Administrative Code 232-13) in December 2007 after years of discussion and extensive public review. As the number of users and types of use continue to increase on WDFW lands, the new rules provide a fair and sensible approach to protecting both fish and wildlife habitats and recreational values consistent with healthy wildlife populations.

These rules, which only apply on WDFW lands, are now in effect. The complete public conduct rule package is available on the web at apps.leg. wa.gov/wac/default.aspx?cite=232-13. Although some conduct rules remain in place and have not changed, the new WAC chapter compiles them in one location for easy reference.

The rules address behavior and conduct, parking, camping, campfires, dumping and littering, target shooting, fireworks, pets, building blinds and tree stands, access, commercial and noncommercial use, and enforcement.

Fire rules allow campfires up to a maximum of three feet in diameter and three feet high

unless posted otherwise. The new rules also include a 21-day camping limit within a 30-day period unless posted otherwise. Vehicles should not be left unattended for more than 21 days. Unattended blinds are available to the public on a "first-come-first-serve" basis. These rules were designed to provide an equal opportunity for all users.

The firearms and target practicing rule prohibits the use of glass, signs, appliances, mattresses, televisions, furniture, and exploding items as targets. With the exception of clay pigeons, debris from target practice should be removed. These rules, along with no-littering laws, address a growing concern for the amount of garbage left on public lands. The rules also prohibit the discharge of firearms within 500 feet of one of the 21 department-designated campgrounds. These very limited shooting restrictions were included to protect the recreating public.

Rules governing pets allow hunters to use hunting dogs under their control, but not to let them or other pets roam unattended. From April through July, all dogs and other pets must be leashed on WDFW lands to protect nesting wildlife.

To manage multiple user groups, a permit from the department is now required for any private or public event involving more than thirty people.

A commercial use permit from the department is required for any activity on department lands where a fee is charged or where the purpose is the sale or barter of a good or service regardless of whether the activity is intended to produce a profit. Hunting guides using WDFW lands are required to obtain a permit through one of WDFW's six regional offices. Permits will be issued on a limited basis to manage the number of hunters. Permit distribution may be used to address equity of hunter access and concerns for local wildlife populations.

All those who use WDFW lands are encouraged to take a look at the new rules.

With the new public conduct rules in place and followed; WDFW public lands will continue to provide safe, beautiful wildlands for all users to enjoy now and in the future.

Persons with Disabilities



WDFW issues a Disabled Hunter Permit to persons with permanent disabilities under certain conditions. For complete information, read

WAC 232-12-828. Hunters with disabilities must follow all hunting regulations and restrictions while using this permit. Not every person with a disability will qualify for the WDFW disabled hunter permit.

It is unlawful for a hunter with disabilities to possess a loaded firearm in their vehicle unless the vehicle is stopped, the motor is turned off and the vehicle is removed from the maintained portion of a roadway. If the road is not paved, and it is impossible to completely remove the vehicle from the road, then the hunter may shoot from the vehicle if it is as far off of the road as possible.

A person with a disability means a person with a **PERMANENT** disability who is:

- Not ambulatory over natural terrain without a prosthesis or assistive device such as, but not limited to wheelchair, crutches, cane.
- Unable to hold or shoot a firearm or other legal hunting device.
- Totally blind or visually impaired. Visually impaired means central visual acuity that

does not exceed 20/200 in the better eye with corrective lenses, or the widest diameter of the visual field is no greater than 20 degrees.

This definition includes, but is not limited to persons with upper or lower extremity impairments who have lost the use of one or both upper or lower extremities, or who have a significant limitation in the use of upper or lower extremities, or who have a diagnosed disease or disorder which substantially impairs or interferes with mobility or the use of upper extremities.

Road Access Entry Program

Many new opportunities are being developed and existing areas may be changing for hunters with disabilities using a motor vehicle to enter "walk-in" only (closed roads) areas.

These opportunities are in cooperation with the Washington Department of Natural Resources (DNR), U.S. Forest Service, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, and private timber companies. Hunters with disabilities who have the official WDFW Disabled Hunter Orange Placard displayed, and under certain conditions identified by special entry permits, MAY be allowed to drive on some roads, otherwise closed to all other unauthorized vehicles. Proper signage and vehicle identification is required.

Able-bodied walk-in hunters must respect hunters with disabilities rights in these areas, and remember that harassment of properly identified persons with disabilities is not allowed.

Access roads are identified through signage at the gated entry points.

Information about road entry opportunities are posted online at wdfw.wa.gov. Information regarding the drawing for special entry areas is posted on the Internet. Information packets are available at WDFW Regional Offices after areas have been secured, or after June 30.

For information about opportunities on DNR lands only, call 360-902-1375.

For other information about any other areas call WDFW at 360-902-2349.

Other opportunities are available through the special deer and elk permit drawings in this pamphlet. Accessible duck and goose blinds are located around the state on private, state, and federal lands (also located on the website or call 360-902-2349). For more information contact any WDFW office.

Vehicle Use Permits



The Department manages nearly 1 million acres of prime wildlife habitat and nearly 700 lake, river, and salt water recreational access area sites across the state for your use and enjoyment.

Vehicle use permits are required to park vehicles at all posted WDFW wildlife areas and water access sites. These permits generate funding for maintenance of WDFW lands and water access sites used by hunters, anglers, boaters, bird watchers, and other recreationalists. Vehicle Use Permits are issued once per year with

the purchase of an annual hunting or fishing license (excluding shellfish/seaweed and razor clam licenses) at no additional charge, or may be purchased separately for \$14.00 each. Permits are transferable between two vehicles. Additional permits may be purchased for \$8.00 each. Permits must be clearly displayed and visible from outside the vehicle. They can be placed on the dash or hung from the rearview mirror. Rearview mirror hangers are available at local license dealerships or by calling WDFW at 360-902-2464.

Hunter's Code of Conduct

Respect the Environment & Wildlife

- Show respect for the wildlife you hunt by taking only clean, killing shots, then retrieving and properly handling your game. Take only what you will use, even if it is under the legal limit.
- Learn to tread lightly while afield. Use vehicles only on established roads and trails, practice low-impact camping and travel, and pack out your trash, including cigarette butts and spent shell casings.
- · Report illegal activities immediately.

Respect Property & Landowners

- Always get permission to hunt on private land.
- Close any gates you open, and never damage crops or property, including fences, outbuildings or livestock.
- Alert landowners or land managers about any problems you find on their property.
- Share your game with the landowner, or say thank you in some other way.

Show Consideration of Non-Hunters

- Remember that the future of hunting depends on hunters and non-hunters alike. Be considerate of non-hunters' sensibilities, and strive to leave them with positive images of hunting and hunters.
- Don't flaunt your kill. Treat game carcasses in an inoffensive manner particularly during transport.

 Be considerate of all outdoor users, including other hunters.

Hunt Safely

- Exercise caution at all times.
- Fire your gun or bow only when you are absolutely sure of your target and its background. Use binoculars, not your rifle scope, to identify your target.
- Wear hunter orange whenever appropriate or required while afield.

Remember that hunting and alcohol don't mix.

Know and Obey the Law

- Obtain proper tags and licenses.
- Hunt only in allowed areas and during designated times and seasons.
- · Obey bag and possession limits.
- Use only legal hunting methods and equipment.

Support Wildlife & Habitat Conservation

- Provide hands-on and financial support for conservation of game and non-game species and their habitats.
- Learn more about wildlife and habitat issues, and urge policymakers to support strong conservation initiatives.
- Become involved in wildlife conservation organizations and their programs.

 Purchase state and federal wildlife conservation stamps, even if such stamps are not required for hunting.

Pass on an Ethical Hunting Tradition

- Invite a young person or a non-hunter next time you go afield to scout or hunt.
- Attend a hunter education course, and urge others to do the same.
- Set high ethical standards for future generations of hunters to help ensure hunting will continue.

Strive to Improve Outdoor Skills & Understanding of Wildlife

- Know the limitations of your skills and equipment, and hunt within those limits.
- Improve your outdoor skills to become more observant, a better hunter, and a better teacher. Sight-in your firearm and bow, and practice shooting to ensure a clean kill in the field.
- Learn more about the habits and habitats of game and non-game wildlife and their management needs.

Hunt Only with Ethical Hunters

- Take pride in being an ethical hunter.
- Insist that your hunting partners behave in a responsible, ethical manner. Compete only with yourself.

You Can Make a Difference and Make a Statement With Personalized License Plates

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) has launched a "Make A Difference – Make A Statement" campaign that is aimed at increasing public awareness of our state's Personalized License Plate program.

Proceeds from the sale of personalized license plates directly benefit Washington's wildlife species and their natural habitat. By buying personalized license plates, Washington vehicle owners support wildlife research, recovery efforts, and viewing opportunities for wildlife species such as bald eagles, burrowing owls, Columbian white-tailed deer, and spotted frogs.

Personalized plates are available for Washington passenger vehicles for \$49.75, with a yearly renewal fee of \$32. Forty dollars of the initial purchase and the entire renewal fee helps conserve wildlife species through WDFW's Wildlife Program. Personalized license plates allow motorists to "Make A Statement" while they "Make a Difference" to Washington's wildlife.

Deferral Option for Hunter Education

Interested individuals ages 10 and older may apply for a once-in-a-lifetime, one license-year deferral of hunter education training. Individuals receiving a deferral may hunt in general seasons through March 31, 2011, but are not eligible to apply **for special permit hunts**. For detailed information on the deferral requirements, please visit our web site at: wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/huntered/he deferral.html.

Individuals requesting a deferral may hunt only under the immediate supervision of an experienced hunter. The accompanying hunter must have valid Washington State hunting licenses for each of the three preceding years.

The deferral requires a \$20, non-refundable application fee and a photocopy of valid identification that includes the applicant's birth date.

Flunter Education Instructor Incentive Permits

- Special deer, elk, and moose permits will be allocated through a random drawing to those hunter education instructors that qualify.
- Permit hunters must use archery equipment during archery seasons, muzzleloader equipment during muzzleloader seasons, and any legal weapon during modern firearm seasons.
- Qualifying hunter education instructors must be certified and have been in active status for a minimum of three consecutive years, inclusive of the year prior to the permit drawing.
- Instructors who are drawn, accept a permit, and are able to participate in the hunt, will not be eligible for these incentive permits for a period of ten years thereafter.
- Permittees may purchase a second license for use with the permit hunt only.

Cooperative Road Management Areas

WDFW, with the help of state, federal and private landowners, coordinates the closure of certain roads to reduce hunter crowding and disturbance to wildlife. Roads have been closed to vehicular traffic in over 65 areas, providing over a million acres of relatively undisturbed prime hunting habitat. It is illegal to operate a motor-driven vehicle on closed roads unless exempted by WDFW or the cooperative agency or company.

Road management areas are generally not closed to all entry, just motorized vehicles. You can walk, bicycle, or horseback ride in the area as much as you like!

There two types of road closures in the program:

 "Posted Closed" System. Roads that are closed in an area are posted "closed to vehicular traffic, including ATVs. 2. Green Dot System. Under this system, all roads in an area are closed <u>unless posted OPEN</u> <u>with a green dot.</u> You may drive on any roads that have circular green reflectors posted along the roadway. Roads without green reflectors are closed to motor vehicles. To help users, large information boards can be found at major points of entry into the area. Areas under the Green Dot System are designated with (*) below.

<u>Only portions</u> of the identified GMUs below contain road management areas. Due to changes in land ownership and multi-partner agreements, the final status of Cooperative Road Management areas may change. Check with cooperating land owners and Regional WDFW offices for any changes.

Why Close Roads?

Studies in the Pacific Northwest have shown that most big game animals avoid active roads by at least one-quarter mile, and some move as much as four miles to escape traffic. Closing roads can provide large undisturbed areas for wildlife, like elk, deer, bighorn sheep, eagles, and wild turkeys during critical times of the year.

Intensively managed forests may have three to nine miles of road for each square mile of habitat. For each mile of road, at least four acres are directly removed as productive habitat.

Animals need energy to survive. Energy spent moving away from disturbances can deplete the energy needed to survive to late spring or give birth to a healthy elk calf. By limiting disturbance, road closures can enhance the health, reproduction, and number of animals in an area.

If you are going to hunt deer, elk, or moose in the following states or provinces this year please be advised that there have been some rule changes passed by the Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission that regulate how you can bring your meat and trophies home.

If you hunt deer, elk, or moose in these states or provinces the following items only may be imported to Washington to reduce the risk of transmitting chronic wasting disease.

- Meat that has been de-boned in the state or province where it was harvested and is imported as boned-out meat.
- Skulls and antlers, antlers attached to the skill plate, or upper canine teeth (bugler, whistlers, ivories) from which all soft tissue has been removed.
- Hides or capes without heads attached.
- Tissue imported for use by a diagnostic or research laboratory.
- Finished taxidermy mounts.

Violation of this rule is a Gross Misdemeanor having a maximum penalty of \$5,000 fine or one year in jail. (RCW 77.15.290)

In addition, if you are notified by another state fish and wildlife agency that the deer, elk, or moose you have harvested has tested positive for chronic wasting disease, you must notify Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife within 24 hours. Violation of this rule is an infraction. (RCW 77.15.160)

Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife has been testing for chronic wasting disease (CWD) since 1995. To date, CWD has not been detected in Washington. 

State Lands

The Washington Department of Natural Resources (DNR) manages 3 million acres of state trust land. These lands are managed primarily to generate income to build public schools, universities, and provide other public benefits. They also are managed to provide habitat for fish and wildlife, and offer the public opportunities for recreation, such as camping, hunting and fishing. Each year, millions of people recreate on public lands; most of them treat the land and its resources with respect, but a few do not. Increasingly, private landowners are closing their lands to protect them from vandalism and theft. DNR wants to continue to keep trust lands open for hunting and fishing, but we need your help.

As a land manager, DNR has the responsibility to manage its land to support wildlife and maintain water quality. Wildlife need snags, trees and brush; fish need streams with clean water and gravel. Healthy habitats help provide healthy fish and wildlife populations. You can help. When you're hunting or fishing, please remember the following:

- · Keep vehicles on roads and out of streams and wetlands.
- · Check your vehicle for weeds, they can grow and crowd out native vegetation.
- Get a permit before cutting firewood.
- · Snags are best used for wildlife habitat, not for firewood.
- · Leave your campsite clean when you leave. Pack it in Pack it out.
- Only tree stands that cause no permanent damage to trees should be used on state lands.
- Check road conditions, roads damaged, due to soft conditions, often lead to them being closed.
- $\bullet\,$ Remember to get landowner approval to access DNR lands that do not have a public access.

• Leave all gates as you found them, if they are open leave them open, if closed leave them closed.

For information on the nearest DNR office, go to our website www.dnr.wa.gov. Report violators when you see abuse. Help keep public lands open to the public.


