

## **Wolf Post-recovery Planning**



Washington's wolf population is on the way to recovery. Although WDFW expects it be at least a few years before wolves are no longer listed as endangered, the agency is starting the process to develop a post-recovery plan to guide long-term wolf conservation and management once wolves are considered recovered.

**1930s**Eliminated from state

1980

Wolves receive state protection

2011

WA Wolf Conservation and Management Plan adopted 2018

Min. 126 wolves, 27 packs, 15 breeding pairs in WA





Wolves receive federal protection



Wolves begin returning naturally to Washington, with the first resident pack being documented in Okanogan County



Wolf Advisory Group formed
