
A career as a fish and wildlife officer

According to Myers, the most challenging part of being a DFW enforcement officer is trying to stop major poachers who do things like snag salmon and try to hide endangered fish and wildlife. "Many times, people doing these types of poaching activities are smart and they don't want to get caught... Trying to catch a poacher is much like an athletic event; sometimes you lose and sometimes you win. A good DFW enforcement officer must be able to keep pushing through the losses, because stopping a poacher is a big win," he said.

For those interested in this career, Myers would encourage them to spend time outside, especially fishing and hunting. "I try to do these activities even more now as an officer so that I understand techniques and strategies that people are using," he said. He added that it also helps him talk to people if he understands why they are doing certain actions.

Additionally, he encourages prospective officers to continue to learn about natural resources and the environment as there is always more to learn about how systems work.
