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Periodic Status Review Process and Timeline Listing Process Guided by WAC 220-610-110

- Periodic review of status every 5 years last Columbian White-tailed Deer PSR 2016
- February 2020 solicit data and information from the public
- August 2022 90 day public comment period on draft
- November 2022 SEPA public comment period
- Listing "...solely on the basis of the biological status of the species being considered, based on the preponderance of scientific data available."
- Listed species: currently more than 75% are classified as Endangered (36 of 47 listed species)




Natural History

- Pacific Northwest endemic species
- Appearance almost indistinguishable from Northwest White-tailed Deer










Columbia River CWTD Population







Endangered

Any wildlife species native to the state of Washington that is seriously threatened with extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range within the state (WAC 220-610-110 [2.4]).




Threatened

Any wildlife species native to the state of Washington that is likely to become an endangered species within the foreseeable future throughout a significant portion of its range within the state without cooperative management or removal of threats (WAC 220-610-110 [2.5]).

Public Comments

- 19 reviewers provided public comments
 - 7 reviewers stated their support of our recommendation.
 - 8 reviewers stated their preference that the species remain state endangered.
 - 1 reviewer was neutral but supported protection
 - 1 reviewer's comment was addressing NEWA whitetail
 - 1 reviewer provided a personal anecdote regarding their positive experience with the species on their property.
 - 1 reviewer provided a comment to improve format of a few of the tables.

Listing Process Guided by WAC 220-610-110


- February 2022 90 day public comment period on draft
 Status Report, recommendation to classify as Threatened
- September 2022 Fish and Wildlife Commission Presentation, Threatened recommendation
- October 2022 Fish and Wildlife Commission vote to classify the species as Endangered
 - Endangered WAC not specifically considered with the code reviser for this species at time of October decision.




- 1) \geq 50% range contraction
- 2) Small population size
- 3) Potential increase in predation and competition from coyotes due to Climate Change
- 4) Climate Change: Increased habitat loss via greater fire frequency, and the anticipated expansion of dense forest cover into occupied fox habitat.
- 5) Potential threat of disease transmission, competition, and hybridization if non-native red foxes invade CRF range.

In order to consider the appropriate WAC 220-610-010, Endangered Wildlife:

- Seeking new vote on decision to classify the Cascade Red Fox as Endangered in Washington.
- 7 comments on the rulemaking
 - 4 supportive of Endangered classification
 - 2 unsupportive of Endangered classification
 - 1 neutral, asking the Department to align trapping and hunting regulations for red fox
