Columbia River Tributaries

Salmon/Steelhead:

Cowlitz River:

Until further notice, the posted fishing boundary markers will be located at the 400-foot distance below the Barrier Dam.

Wind River:

Effective March 16, 2023 until further notice, from the mouth to 800 yards downstream of Carson National Fish Hatchery: Salmon and hatchery steelhead: Daily limit 6. Up to 1 adult salmon and 1 hatchery steelhead or up to 2 hatchery steelhead may be retained. Release all salmon other than hatchery Chinook and hatchery coho.

Klickitat River:

From the mouth to Fisher Hill Bridge: Effective April 1 through May 26, 2023: Salmon and hatchery steelhead: Daily limit 2, of which up to 1 may be an adult salmon. Release wild Chinook. Open Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays only.

 Beginning May 27, 2023 until further notice: Salmon: Daily limit 6, of which up to 1 may be an adult. Release wild Chinook.

Klickitat River:

From 400 feet upstream of #5 fishway to boundary markers below Klickitat Salmon Hatchery: Effective May 27, 2023 until further notice, Salmon: Closed.

Fishery Reports:

Columbia River Tributaries

Salmon/Steelhead:

Cowlitz River I-5 Br downstream – 58 bank rods kept two Chinook. 5 boats/12 rods had no catch.

Cowlitz River Above the I-5 Br - 12 bank rods kept one Chinook and released one steelhead. 1 boat/2 rods kept one Chinook.

Kalama River – 47 bank rods kept two Chinook. 37 boats/87 rods kept 14 Chinook, one jack and released three steelhead.

Lewis River – Three bank rods had no catch.

Wind River – 21 bank rods had no catch. 177 boats/619 rods kept 113 Chinook, two jacks, two steelhead and released three Chinook and one steelhead.

Drano Lake – 47 bank rods kept one Chinook and released one Chinook. 203 boats/616 rods kept 160 Chinook and released two Chinook.

Klickitat River below Fisher Hill Bridge – Two bank rods had no catch.
