Background summary:

Staff presented the final Periodic Status Review and classification recommendation for the Western Gray Squirrel at the October 2023 briefing. The squirrel is currently listed as a threatened species in WA. The Periodic Status Review summarizes the biology and conservation concerns for the species and recommends changes in classification from threatened to be endangered.

Staff recommendation:

Uplist the Western Gray Squirrel from threatened to endangered.

Policy issue(s) and expected outcome:

If approved, the Western Gray Squirrel will be added to the endangered wildlife list. A change in classification would also be communicated to the Department of Natural Resources for their forest practice considerations.

Fiscal impacts of agency implementation:

None anticipated at this time.

Public involvement process used and what you learned:

The Periodic Status Review had its own 90-day public comment period. Through that process we identified areas of confusion with western gray squirrels and eastern gray squirrels and what this status review and potential rule change could mean (incorrectly) for the common nonnative eastern gray squirrel. We also identified misunderstanding or confusion in the results of the data collected and analyzed to inform the draft Periodic Status Review which we have worked to clarify with stakeholders and have attempted to address in our final document available on the WDFW website (https://wdfw.wa.gov/publications/02410).

There was also public testimony during the October briefing as well as written and submitted comment as part of the rule-making and SEPA processes. In total we received over 900 comments on the classification change. More than 700 comments were one of two form letters in support of the recommendation to reclassify western gray squirrels as endangered. We received 141 and 15 comments independent of the form letter supporting and opposing the recommendation respectively. However, we continue to see confusion over eastern and western gray squirrels and what this rule making applies to, so it is difficult to fully understand the relevance of every comment. We are working with the Communications and Public Engagement team to improve awareness and better share information on the two species. There are also two separate groups of comments related to voluntary habitat and land management to benefit squirrels. Those in favor (including local and statewide conservation groups) of the reclassification are describing how those voluntary actions are inadequate or ineffective, and those not in favor (including the WA Forest Protection Association, and Klickitat Board of Commissioners) of the uplisting describing a change in classification would discourage future voluntary actions.

Recommended adoption of these rules as presented.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 23-12-051, filed 6/1/23, effective 7/2/23)

WAC 220-200-100 Wildlife classified as protected shall not be hunted or fished. Protected wildlife are designated into three subcategories: Threatened, sensitive, and other.

(1) Threatened species are any wildlife species native to the state of Washington that are likely to become endangered within the foreseeable future throughout a significant portion of their range within the state without cooperative management or removal of threats. Protected wildlife designated as threatened include:

Finally, the western gray squirrel already has a recovery plan required by WAC 220-610-110.

If the status change is adopted, western gray squirrel will be removed from the list of threatened species in WAC 220-200-100 "Wildlife classified as protected shall not be hunted or fished" and added to the list of endangered species under WAC 220-610-010.

Reasons supporting proposal: Important known threats to the western gray squirrel populations in Washington are:

- Habitat loss.
- Habitat degradation and fragmentation.
- Small population size and isolation.

Disease and highway mortality.

Western Gray Squirrel habitat loss is linked to timber extraction, wildfire, and land conversion. Climate change is both a current and potential future threat to habitat. Examples include stand-replacement fire, changes in resulting stand composition, and effects on food supply such as production of fungi and seeds.

The southern Puget Trough population has increased since 2007s recovery plan. However, it is still very limited in size and constrained by the area and fragmentation of its habitat. In addition, the final Periodic Status Review describes continued habitat loss of >20% in the other two isolated core population areas on the east slope of the cascades due to timber extraction and wildfire. A primary threat identified in the original listing of the species was habitat loss, which has only increased since listing.

Because of the species' small total population size and the isolation of the three populations; continuing threats of wildfires and timber harvest; and a likely decline in habitat of >20% in both the North Cascades and Klickitat regions, it is recommended that the Western Gray Squirrel be uplisted to endangered in Washington.
