



#### *RCW 79a.15 – Acquisition of Habitat Conservation and Outdoor Recreation Lands*

"It is therefore the policy of the state to acquire as soon as possible the most significant lands for wildlife conservation and outdoor recreation purposes before they are converted to other uses, and to develop existing public recreational land and facilities to meet the needs of present and future generations."

#### Specifically, to:

- Conserve and restore the diversity of Washington's fish and wildlife species and habitats
- Enhance sustainable fishing, hunting and other wildlife-related outdoor opportunities
- Improve management of current WDFW Lands
- Preserve opportunity for continued working lands for agriculture, forestry, and other sectors of the outdoor economy, when and where compatible

## **Strategic Acquisition Priorities**

- Goal 1: Conserve and protect native fish and wildlife
  - Aquatic Habitats, Conserve and protect native fish and wildlife
  - Critical Habitat for Specific Species, Conserve and protect native fish and wildlife

- Goal 4: Build an effective and efficient organization by supporting our workforce, improving business processes, and investing in technology





#### **Strategic Acquisition Priorities** for Land Acquisitions

Designed to provide guidance on what land to buy and where to buy it in support of WDFW's <u>Mission</u> and mandate (<u>RCW 77.04.012</u>) to preserve, protect, perpetuate, and manage fish and wildlife species of the state, and provide recreational opportunities. Prior to acquiring a parcel of land, a deliberate process is used to ensure fee-title acquisition is better than any other tools available: conservation easement, voluntary protection, regulatory protection, ownership by a local land trust, another state agency or local entity, incentives, or education of landowner. 



  - Needs more regional scoping and need discussion


