There's something so special about witnessing wildlife close to home - and this time of year, that can include seeing young wildlife. What happens, though, when you find wildlife offspring alone, with no adult to be found? What do you do? Should you

Every year, we receive calls from people who find young wildlife alone in nature and think they've been abandoned. Sometimes, concern for the young animal's wellbeing drives people to remove the wildlife from their habitat and bring it to a wildlife rehabilitator, or into their own home to try to raise it themselves.

Unfortunately, this "help" often does more harm than good. Just because wildlife babies are alone does not mean they need help! In most situations, wildlife - even young wildlife - found alone are happy and healthy, and do not need to be "rescued."

If you have found a wild animal in genuine need of care, call a wildlife rehabilitator as soon as possible and follow their instructions. Wildlife species differ widely in terms of their capture, care, and handling requirements. If you are not properly trained, you could make an animal's situation worse. Do not attempt to treat or raise a wild animal yourself - it's illegal.

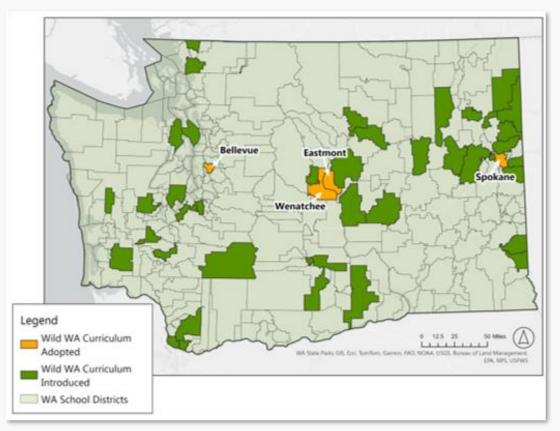

- Native plant seed distribution









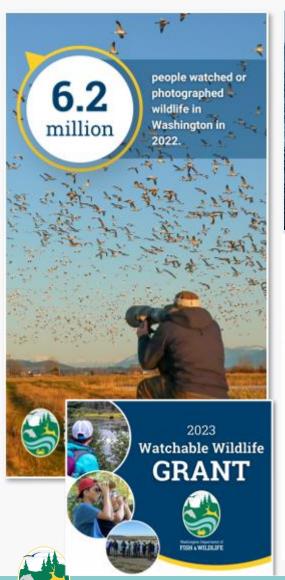








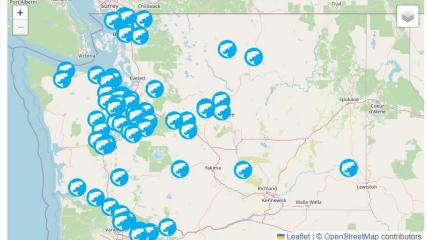
Watchable Wildlife

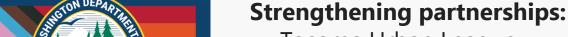

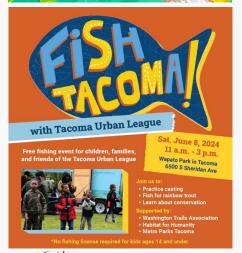

Family Fishing Events





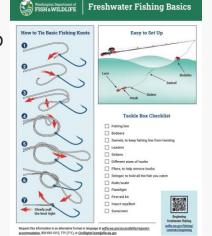


In the last two seasons, WDFW hosted nearly 30 family fishing events and reached ~10,000 people.

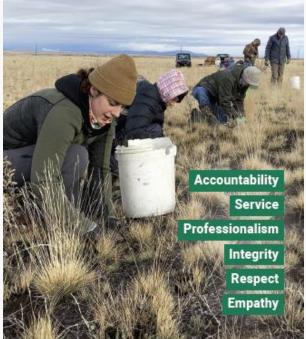






The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) welcomes volunteers of all abilities who want to contribute to conservation of fish, wildlife, and habitat.

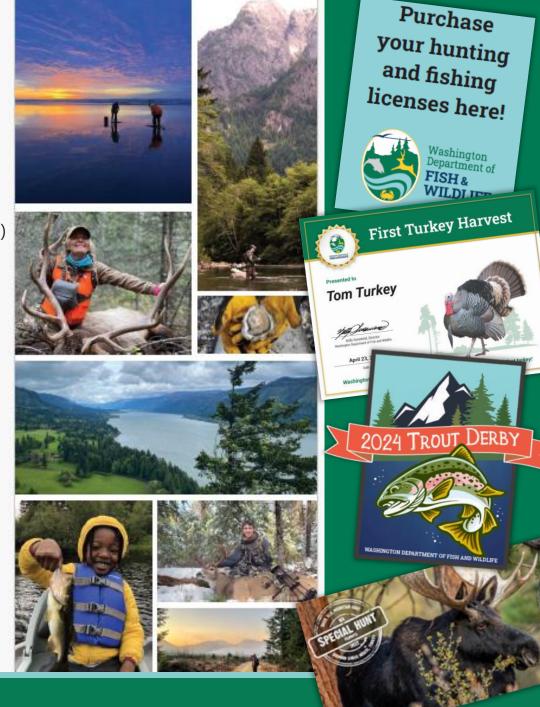
