

PROGRAM INFORMATION & ELIGIBILITY QUESTIONNAIRE

Thanks for your interest in the ALEA Grant Program. Please read the below information and answer the eligibility questions if you wish to apply. After review of your responses and if eligible, you will be sent the grant application.

Program Purpose

WDFW ALEA grants support individuals and organizations that utilize volunteers to implement projects throughout Washington that protect and enhance fish, wildlife, and their habitats; provide fish and wildlife recreational opportunities; educate the public about our fish and wildlife resources; and conduct fish and wildlife science.

Basics of WDFW ALEA Grants

- Applications are reviewed and scored by a panel of WDFW staff from across the state. Based on their evaluations, a ranked list of projects is generated and presented to WDFW's Executive Management Team (EMT) and the Director for approval.
- Grantees will have up to two years to complete their project objectives.
- Grant funds are disbursed on a cost-reimbursement basis. Grantees must make purchases
 according to state purchasing guidelines and submit backup documentation, such as invoices or
 receipts, to be reimbursed.
- Grant funds can't be used for salaries, wages, stipends or benefits for staff or other participants. - Only project costs incurred within the grant period will be reimbursed.
- WDFW will assign one staff person to be the grantee's field contact. Field contacts are available to provide technical assistance and will conduct a project site visit and report annually.
- For certain projects, the grantee's volunteers must register as volunteers with WDFW.
- Grantees are required to submit quarterly progress reports and a comprehensive final project report.
- Grantees may need to hire an archaelogist for cultural resources surveys and related work if ground-disturbing activities are planned.

Funding for the 2025-2027 biennium

- We expect to have approximately \$896,900* available for grants this biennium.
- Individual grant requests are capped at 5% of total available funds. Currently, the cap is \$44,845.

^{*}The final amount will be subject to legislative appropriation and won't be finalized until approved in the 2025 legislative session.

Grant Program Timeline

- December 1, 2024-February 28, 2025: application period
- March 1, 2025 approx. May 10: ALEA Review Panel evaluation period
- June 1, 2025: applicant notification of funding decisions
- July 1, 2025: grant period begins
- June 30, 2027: grant period ends
