# Background

- These Rules have needed updating for a long time
- The new CWD plan Identified captive cervids as a possible risk source for CWD
- This was supposed to be part of the rules delegated to the director



# What rules need updating?

- WAC 220-450-030 Live wildlife— Taking from the wild, importation, possession, transfer, and holding in captivity
- WAC 220-640-200 Deleterious
  exotic wildlife



WAC 220-450-030 Live Wildlife

- Striking section 8 which refers Retention or disposal of existing specimens lawfully in captivity prior to June 20, 1992
- Cleaning up some of the outdated language.



WAC 220-640-200 Deleterious exotic wildlife

 Make clear that it is unlawful to import into the state, hold, possess, propagate, offer for sale, sell, transfer, or release live specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife, their gametes and/or embryo, except as provided under subsection except reindeer and fallow deer



WAC 220-640-200 Deleterious exotic wildlife

 Remove outdated language that refers to animals that would have been in captivity from the1990s and should have long perished



WAC 220-640-200 Deleterious exotic wildlife

 Create multiple new WACs under the same chapter with permit condition, and requirements specific to cervids in captivity



WAC 220-640-200 Deleterious exotic wildlife

- The new WACs are likely to cover the following topics:
  - Permit requirements
  - Permit Modification, Suspension, or Revocation
  - Animal identification requirement
  - Importation requirements
  - Animal Identification requirements
  - Fencing requirement
  - Escaped animals
  - Disease and parasite testing requirements
  - Herd inventory, inspection and reporting requirements
  - Disposition of deceased animal reporting requirements
  - Quarantine requirements
  - Seizure authority
