



Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C. 703-712)

MBTA 10.13 List (50 CFR 10.13)
Prohibits take, including parts,
feathers, in-use nests, or eggs,
without authorization

Common authorizations (50 CFR Part 21):

Depredation
Scientific Collecting
Special Purpose Utility
Live Possession (e.g.,
Rehab, live education)
Import/Export



Regulatory Authorizations for Migratory Birds

Birds in Buildings: Anyone may humanely remove a bird from the interior of a building or structure

Infectious disease: Government health/wildlife agencies may collect sick or dead birds for disease analysis

AZA Zoos & Public Scientific/Education Institutions: Can possess & sell birds among themselves (not collect)

Good Samaritan: Anyone may transport sick, injured, or orphaned birds to a permitted rehabilitator

Veterinarians: Licensed vets can triage/euthanize sick or injured birds

Regulatory Authorizations for Migratory Bird and Eagle Possession by the General Public, Educators, and Government Agencies December 31, 2024.

Clarified language in regulatory authorizations

Can add drone use on permits

New regulatory authorizations (replace permits):
Salvage,
Agency natural-resource employees, and

Exhibition of eagle specimens.

Regulatory Authorizations Natural Resource Agency Employees

Authorized activities

- Salvage
- Exhibition use
- Transport
- Relocate



Missing – Incidental Take Regulation

Director's Order

- MBTA prohibits incidental take of migratory birds and will enforce the statute accordingly

Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (16 U.S.C. 668-668d)

"BGEPA" (also protected under MBTA)

Prohibits take, including parts, feathers, nests, or eggs, without authorization

Common authorizations (50 CFR Part 22):

- Disturbance
- Nest take
- · Incidental take
- Hazing
- Scientific collecting
- Education (Dead or alive)
- Tribal use (members and tribal leaders)

For research

Needs a study design

Human health and safety



 with DCCO, links to
 regulation, NEPA, and
 permit application

Special Purpose Agency Species Protection Permit

- Government Agency
- Management Plan
- Species of Concern Protection
- Localized population control
- Additional tools (blinds, lures, baits, calls etc.)

Keep In Mind – Planning!


NEPA – Permit issuance = Federal action

60 days minimum

Renewal requests

- -if simple renewal request, all needed information and annual report submitted prior to 30 days of expiration
- -then work is authorized to continue under current permit
