# **Department's Impacts**

### **WDFW Impacts**

• Last month, WDFW began the layoff process for 29 filled positions. Many more positions were cut.



### **WDFW Impacts**

- Last month, WDFW began the layoff process for 29 filled positions. Many more positions were cut.
- The Department is reducing our motor pool vehicle fleet and administrative costs, limiting travel, reducing contracted facilitation services with outside vendors, making targeted cuts to professional services contracts, and reducing funding for professional development.
- Business operations impacted such as service desk and desktop support, information governance, internal auditing, public records, IT Consulting, Networking and Human Resources and Budget functions.



### **Biodiversity Impacts**

The Department's funding for work to protect and restore Washington's biodiversity was permanently reduced by \$2 million. This will impact pinto abalone and sturgeon contract work, biodiversity grant dollars to partners and NGOs, habitat restoration project development and implementation capacity, and habitat related project management and coordination.



#### **Hatchery Production Evaluation**

The hatchery production evaluation funding that the Legislature provided in the 2022 supplemental budget was cut in half. This work provides the data needed to assess and improve hatchery operations and adaptively manage hatchery programs under changing environmental conditions. This impacts management goals and natural populations' ability to rebuild.

#### **Toutle and Skamania hatcheries**

The Toutle and Skamania hatchery budget request was reduced by more than half, resulting in the closure of Skamania hatchery. Some production will be transferred to other facilities and returning adult fish will be collected for a period of time to meet broodstock needs.



#### **Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account Volunteer (ALEA) grants**

The <u>Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account Volunteer Cooperative Grant Program</u> was defunded. This eliminates \$900,000 in funds to complete projects including habitat restoration, hatchery production and community outreach.

#### **Lake Washington Predator Suppression**

This reduction eliminates the ability to estimate out migrating juvenile sockeye and significantly impacts the ability to control predators eating juvenile salmonids.



#### Salmon and steelhead monitoring

One-time funding for salmon and steelhead monitoring in the Puget Sound was not funded ongoing in the budget, resulting in eliminating the Skagit River steelhead catchand-release fishery and reducing scientific work to improve escapement estimation methods. This reduction also reduces capacity to monitor other fisheries in the Snohomish and Stillaguamish River systems.



#### Columbia River fishery management evaluation plans

Reduces staff capacity to complete the six fishery management evaluation plans in the Columbia River. This reduction slows the ability to complete these plans, putting the affected fisheries at risk.

#### **Emerging Fisheries Impacts**

This reduction is focused on the Columbia River Commercial Fisheries. Reduces our capacity to test alternative commercial fishing gear. Slows progress in implementation of the Commission's Columbia River Policy.



### Wildlife Program Impacts

#### **Ecological assessment and STRII**

The lack of funding for this work eliminates our ability to lead and coordinate our ecological assessment work and support development of technical tools and data management. This reduces our direct participation in the State-Tribal Recreation Impacts Initiative work, although we still retain capacity in base funding for participation at the planning and policy level.

#### Lands stewardship and maintenance

We lost funding used for stewardship and maintenance of WDFW-managed lands. This will impact the agency's ability to maintain roadways and access points during the 2025-2027 biennium.



### Wildlife Program Impacts

#### Forest health, fuel reductions

The loss in funding will require us to reconfigure this work, focus more on grant writing and collaborating with other entities like DNR and the USFS. We expect an overall reduction in the pace of acres treated.

#### **Western Washington Pheasant Program**

The funding for our Western WA Pheasant Program was reduced. The reduction doesn't affect the 2025 pheasant season but will likely affect future seasons.



### Wildlife Program Impacts

#### **Puget Sound Pinniped**

Partial funding was provided to continue a Columbia River sea lion management program, but the Puget Sound work was lost.

#### Wildlife disease

The funding to respond to wildlife disease was drastically reduced from the agency's request. The funding is provided specifically for chronic wasting disease, leaving no additional funding for other wildlife diseases, such as avian influenza.



### **Habitat Program Impacts**

#### **Streamflow policy support**

WDFW did not receive the funding required for continued and expanded investigations into the efficacy of streamflow mitigation and restoration measures, continued strategic relationship building and information sharing with stakeholders on water issues, and the development of policy strategies to protect and increase stream flows.

#### Fish barrier prioritization

The Department did not receive operating funds to continue its work to prioritize fish passage barrier removal statewide.

#### Riparian systems assessment

WDFW also didn't receive the funding necessary to continue development of a decision support tool, the Riparian Data Engine (RDE), to guide and optimize investments to improve riparian habitat condition and function and aid in salmon recovery.



### **Habitat Program Impacts**

#### **Habitat Recovery Pilot Program**

Ongoing funding for the Habitat Recovery Pilot Program (HRPP) was cut. The HRPP was designed to streamline the local and state environmental permitting process for habitat recovery projects that benefit freshwater, estuarine, or marine fish or their habitats.

#### **APPS Maintenance and Operations**

We received half of the required ongoing funding to maintain the new online HPA permitting application. This funding covers license fees and staff time in support of the system.

#### **DNR** passthrough reductions

We received cuts to passthrough funding for both Teanaway Community Forest restoration efforts in Region 3 and Forest Practices work statewide.



### **Enforcement Program Impacts**

Some equipment will be deferred to the next biennium and travel is reduced.

#### **Fisheries Enforcement Compliance**

Funding for enforcement officers is reduced.

Enforcement has now stopped hiring. All funded positions are filled.





### License Fee Increase Information

### **License Fee Increase Impacts**

You may receive calls or emails about SB 5583 (Concerning recreational fishing and hunting licenses). The governor signed this bill in May, and the bill was not agency-request legislation. This bill reflects a 38% fee increase. The cost people will see in the RCW language does not reflect the out-the-door cost for licenses as there may be added fees.

Although this bill is an increase to revenue for the Department, most of the revenue is used to cover increased costs due to compensation while the remainder of the revenue is used to offset State General Fund reductions as a fund swap. The swap is \$10.1 million for 2025-27 and \$7 million per biennium ongoing thereafter. # 2026 Session

- Washington has a "balanced budget", this is over 4 years as part of the "budget outlook"
- The Legislature uses the official revenue forecasts for resources available
- The Budget outlook is updated using June 24 forecast
  - Revenue forecast decreased compared to March
  - Federal budget introduces increased uncertainty
  - Increased tort liabilities

# **Capital Budget**

### **Capital Asks**

### Requirement:

 Critical or emergent costs that cannot be accommodated with savings or efficiencies in the existing budget

Cannot be addressed through the minor works budget



### 2 Major Works Projects

Snow Creek Resort – Currently a major works design project with no new funding in 25-27. Seeking \$175,000 to complete demolition of nuisance structures and ensure a safer access site for the public. Already part of 10-year capital plan, just need a bridge to 27-29 capital construction request.

Bob Oke Pheasant Farm – Emergent concerns over nitrates in soil and ground water. New major works request. Seeking \$500,000 to cover design costs ahead of 27-29 request for \$4.5M to construct new pens and nitrate treatment.
