Background:

Multiple season permits allow deer or elk hunters to hunt during all general seasons for archery, muzzleloader, and modern firearms. Interest in these permits continues to be very high with over 8500 applications received annually for each category. The permits are allocated through an annual permit application and drawing process conducted by the department. Successful applicants are informed that they may purchase the permit until September 1st each year. In 2011, 4000 hunters were drawn for multi-season deer permits and 850 hunters were drawn for multi-season elk permits, of those approximately 2200 deer permits and 680 elk permits were purchased by the deadline.

Harvest rates by multiple season permit holders are higher than hunters who only hunt during one season, but are not considered problematic for deer or elk population management. The permit holders distribute themselves across the state and have not created any significant harvest or management concerns for biologists.

The department is recommending expanding the number of permits available for purchase with the increased revenue being used to expand the state's wildlife conflict program for deer and elk. We are recommending increasing the number of deer hunters drawn to 8500 and the number of elk hunters drawn to 1250, which should result in about 4600 deer permits and 1000 elk permits sold.

The department is asking the 2012 Legislature for the authority to spend the anticipated revenue for expanding our wildlife conflict program. This would allow the program to expand from its current status in Benton, Yakima, and Kittitas Counties to other priority areas of the state. The wildlife conflict program has been successfully piloted in these counties to improve assistance to property owners in preventing property damage, while helping the agency better achieve elk population objectives.

Provide sustainable deer and elk hunting opportunity.

This program has been continually modified and improved through the Fish and Wildlife Commission's rule making process over the past several years with good support from hunters.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 10-313, filed 12/6/10, effective 1/6/11)

WAC 232-28-294 Multiple season big game permits. The commission may, by rule, offer permits for hunters to hunt deer or elk during more than one general season.

An annual drawing will be conducted by the department for multiple season permits.

- (1) Multiple season big game hunting permit applications:
- (a) To apply for multiple season big game hunting season permits for deer or elk, applicants must purchase a permit application.
- (b) No refunds or exchanges for applications will be made for persons applying for multiple season big game hunting season permits after the application has been submitted.
- (c) An applicant may purchase only one application for a multiple season big game hunting season permit for each species.
 - (d) Permits will be randomly drawn by computer selection.
 - (e) Incomplete applications will not be accepted.
- (f) The department will establish application and drawing dates.
 - (2) The bag limit for this permit is one deer or elk.
 - (3) Multiple season permits:
- (a) Hunters who are drawn will be required to purchase their original deer or elk license, corresponding to their permit, and the multiple season big game permit.
- (b) Successful applicants will be allowed to purchase their permit at any time prior to September 1st.
 - (c) The permits are not transferable.
- (4) Permit holders are required to follow all rules and restrictions for general season hunters within the game management unit or area hunted.
