# **Biology**

#### Giant Pacific Octopus (Enteroctopus doflenini)

- Range: California to Alaska and south to Japan
- Depth: intertidal to 750 m
- Size: weight range 40 100 lbs., average maximum length 15 ft.
- Lifespan: 3-5 years
- Life history: Females lay 20-100k eggs
- Up to 230 day incubation
- Females die after eggs hatch
- Juvenile planktonic stage up to 90 days
- Sexual maturity during second year

## **Harvest Management**

- Puget Sound Recreational Harvest
  - Year-round, daily limit 1
  - Closed in Hood Canal (MA 12)
  - Harvest by hand or instrument which will not penetrate the body
  - Lawful to retain octopus taken while angling with hook and line gear
  - Lack full accounting of recreational harvest
  - 2007-2011 Boat based estimate:
    - Total 25 Octopuses harvested
    - Total 76 Octopuses released
    - 300 divers surveyed 1 Octopus harvested

## Harvest Management

- Puget Sound Commercial Harvest
  - 1998-2000 direct harvest of octopuses by shellfish pot averaged about 100 lbs. annually
  - 2001 pot fishery closed -- only incidental catch allowed
  - 2007-2011 on average less than 50 lbs. landed annually

#### **Status**

- Lack a formal status assessment
- Biology and harvest management suggests that Giant Pacific Octopuses are healthy in Puget Sound
  - Fast growth, short lived and high fecundity
  - Low harvest rates

## **Seacrest Cove Incident**

- October 31: Giant Pacific Octopus legally harvested at Seacrest Cove 2 in Alki
- November 8: Director briefed Commission and heard public testimony
- December 21: Commission briefing on three petitions to protect Giant Pacific Octopus
- January 11:
- Commission briefing on management options, process and schedule

## **Process and Schedule**

- January 2013: Solicit nominations for ad-hoc Puget Sound GPO advisory group.
- February 2013: Convene GPO advisory group and develop draft options for consideration.
- February and March 2013: Public workshops on draft options for protection of GPO.
- April 2013: Commission briefing on draft options and recommendations for protection of GPO in Puget Sound.
- June 2013: Commission meeting and public testimony on draft options and recommendations.
- August 2013: Commission action on draft options for protection of GPO in Puget Sound.

## **Management Options**

- Option 1: Status quo
- Option 2: Puget Sound wide closure of recreational harvest of Giant Pacific Octopus
- Option 3: Closure to recreational harvest of Giant Pacific Octopus at popular dive sites in Puget Sound
- Option 4: Closure of recreational harvest of all species (no take) at popular dive sites in Puget Sound
