Preserve, protect and perpetuate fish, wildlife and ecosystems they depend on while providing sustainable fish and wildlife recreational and commercial opportunities.


Law Enforcement Program's Role

We serve the public by providing professional natural-resource law enforcement, protecting public safety, responding to emergency incidents, and building partnerships within our communities.

Authorizing Environment

- The mission and responsibilities of the Law Enforcement Program arise from several RCW and WAC Titles, primarily:
 - RCW Title 77 Fish and Wildlife
 - RCW Title 9 and 9a General Crimes
 - RCW Title 10 Criminal Procedure
 - WAC 220 and 232
- Fish and Wildlife Police Officers also enforce a number of laws pertaining to other criminal acts, boating safety, motor vehicles, vandalism, etc.



A Lot of Ground to Cover

Fish and Wildlife Police Officers provide a police presence for over <u>1 million acres</u> of agency owned and protected land, <u>5 million acres</u> of DNR lands, and thousands of acres of private lands and water.




A Lot of Ground to Cover

- Washington has 8,000 lakes and 40,000 miles of rivers and streams.


 Total shoreline measures 3,026 miles, including the Strait of Juan de Fuca and the Puget Sound.

WA State Population Growth




Nearly Two Decades of Decreased Staffing

Since 1994, Fish and Wildlife Police Officer staffing levels have decreased nearly 20%, while the state's population has grown by a slightly higher rate.




2008 IACP Staffing Study




Staffing Comparison





- The number of ESA-listed species in Washington State has doubled since 1994.
- 47 fish and wildlife species are WDFW-listed for protection and 43 are federally listed in WA.


