Background summary:

Department staff members will brief the Commission on the Periodic Status Reviews compiled for Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, American White Pelican, Lynx, and Marbled Murrelet in accordance with WAC 232-12-297. These documents on five state listed species outline the current status of the species and include information and comments provided by peer scientists and the public. Staff will provide their recommendations to the Commission to reclassify these species.

Policy issue(s) you are bringing to the Commission for consideration:

- Protect and conserve Washington's native wildlife.
- Continue recovery actions for these state-listed species.

Public involvement process used and what you learned:

On February 11, 2015, the agency sent out a press release and launched a website to solicit information from the public to be included in the periodic status reviews. In accordance with WAC, individuals and organizations had one year to contribute information for the reviews. Staff included this information, as applicable, in the status review documents. The documents were then reviewed by WDFW staff and external species experts before a 90-day public comment period and a concurrent SEPA 90-day comment period began on the document and our findings. The comments were collated, responded to, and included in the final periodic status reviews.

Attachment A

The department has reviewed all relevant data pertaining to the population status of bald eagle, peregrine falcon, American white pelican, North American (Canada) lynx, and marbled murrelet in Washington. Protection measures to recover the bald eagle have abated primary threats allowing the species to make an incredible recovery both within Washington as well as nationally. While there are still potential threats across the landscape, the preponderance of evidence suggests that the bald eagle population continues to grow despite those threats. Like bald eagle, primary threats to peregrine falcons have been ameliorated and the current population demographics and positive growth trajectory warrant removal from the State's list of endangered, threatened, and sensitive species.

Concurrent with range wide increases, the numbers of American white pelicans observed in Washington have increased substantially in the last 30 years, although with just a single population in Washington the species remains vulnerable.

Information on the North American (Canada) lynx indicates that the state population has declined likely largely from the loss of suitable habitat due to wildfires. Washington's marbled murrelet population has continued to decline due to a number of factors, including loss and fragmentation of suitable nesting habitat, nest predation, and changes in availability of prey in the marine environment.
