## Listed Species in Washington

- Currently 45 listed species
- WAC 232-12-297 requires that we review the status of listed species every five years to determine if they require:
  - Uplisting (e.g., sensitive to endangered)
  - Downlisting (e.g., endangered to threatened)
  - Delisting (i.e., removal from list)
  - No change in status



- 2014: ~43k in western states






- Single colony in WA, but numbers are increasing



#### **Marbled Murrelet Status**


- Federally Threatened in WA, OR & CA since 1992
- Primary listing reason: loss and modification of nesting habitat
- Other: low juvenile recruitment, chemical pollution, fisheries net mortality
- WA State Threatened in 1993




## Marbled Murrelets in WA Today

- Washington population declining at 4.4% per year
- Past and continued loss of nesting habitat
- Continued low juvenile recruitment
- Despite past management, 44% decline in abundance since 2001

## Lynx Status


- Harvested furbearer until 1991

- Federally Threatened in 2000






## Lynx in WA Today

- Significant range contraction and small estimated population size (~54 Lynx)
- Loss of forest cover and prey
  - Especially due to wildfire
- Limited immigration from BC
- Climate change effects to
  - Snow distribution, depth, condition, and persistence
  - Fire frequency, severity
  - Prey distribution and density
