Target Shooting Context & Trends

- DNR, WDFW and USFS lands in Washington are popular for target shooting
- Agencies facing similar land management challenges
 - Increasing numbers of visitors
 - Greater diversity of recreation activities
 - Increasing use for target shooting
 - Public safety concerns
 - Habitat protection issues



Agency Target Shooting Goals

- Recognize the diverse & increasing use of lands
- Provide target shooting opportunities
- Protect habitat from shooting related impacts
- Address public safety concerns
- Recognize & support Pittman-Robertson funding from target shooters
- Contribute to hunter R3
 - Recruitment
 - Retention
 - Reactivation



WDFW Lands for Conservation and Recreation

WAC 220-500-010

Declaration of purpose—Department lands.

The primary purpose of department lands is the preservation, protection, per tuation and management of fish and wildlife and their habitats. Public use of department lands may include fishing, hunting, fish and wildlife appreciation, and other outdoor recreational opportunities when compatible with healthy and diverse fish and wildlife populations.

Wenas Wildlife Area Target Shooting

- Popular activity for years
- Increasing challenges
 - Wildfire; 9,000 acresburned in 2014
 - Trash; tons removed each year
 - Habitat loss
 - Concerns by other users



Wenas Wildlife Area Past Actions & Lessons Learned

- Efforts began in 2011
- Specific proposals shared in 2016
 - Concerns expressed
 - Homeowners
 - Target shooters
- August 2016 Agency hit the "reset button"



Wenas Wildlife Area Current Approach

- Removed 2016 specific proposals
- Developed a vision & goals
- Hired Ross Strategic
- Formed advisory committee
- Transparent process to find solutions

Wenas Wildlife Area Target Shooting Vision

Continue to offer shooting opportunities for hunters and other responsible target shooters, while conserving wildlife habitat, providing safe recreational opportunities for the diversity of users, and, providing for the safety of adjoining land owners.

Wenas Wildlife Area Agency Target Shooting Goals

Provide target shooting opportunities that:

- Are supported by local communities
- Reduce risk to wildlife area users and neighbors
- Improve habitat protection
- Reduce wildfire risks
- Are financially attainable and manageable
- Provide predictability for all users
- Adhere to clear and concise standards



Wenas Target Shooting Advisory Committee Preliminary Recommendations

- Enhance education and outreach w/ existing staff
- Hire additional staff: Outreach & Ed, Enforcement
- Adopt target shooting rule consistent with DNR
- Improve current concentrated target shooting areas



Wenas Wildife Area Next Steps

- Advisory committee report
- Continue working w/ advisory committee on implementation of recommendations
- Phase-in recommendations



Agency Target Shooting Rule Change

- Explore the improvement of the existing rule to:
 - Increase safety
 - Be consistent with DNR rule
 - Provide certainty to target shooters on checkerboard lands
 - Allow improved rule enforcement
- Statewide assessment & external outreach
- Tentative Rule Timeline
 - Public hearing, June 2018
 - Public hearing & Commission action, August 2018

Other Target Shooting Opportunities

- Central Washington Shooting Facility
 - Huge need and desire for developed site
 - Significant local support
 - Opportunity for public-private partnership

Step 1: Secure new site to develop – Kittitas Field & Stream, Kittitas County Board of Commissioners and Sheriff, WDFW

Step 2: Formulate larger partnership with interested stakeholders

Step 3: Develop site

Recap

- Recognize target shooting is increasing
- WDFW lands play important role
 - Pittman-Robertson \$\$
 - Hunter Recruitment, Retention, & Reactivation (R3)
- Existing issues & opportunities
- Wenas has been a hotbed for a long time
