
### Policy Guidance: C-3001

- In effect March 1, 2014—December 31, 2018
- Increase the abundance of the spawning population
- Manage with a precautionary approach
- Population monitoring (within available resources)
  - Young-of-the-year sampling
  - Evaluate legal-size abundance methods
  - Monitor sea lion predation
- Maintain viable and diverse fishing opportunities
- Delegation of Authority to the Director for management


#### Recent Guidance

- Retention prohibited since Jan. 1, 2014
- Work with ODFW staff to manage White Sturgeon harvest in 2017







### Legal-Size Abundance: 38–54" FL




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
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
### Legal-Size CPUE: 38-54" FL




#### Adult Abundance Estimates: >65" FL



### Population Composition: 2010–2017




#### Estimated Abundance in 2017




### Age-0 Catch Per Net




Lower Columbia River




Willamette River

### 2017 Retention Fishery Allocation

- Total Catch Guideline: 6,235 fish
- Commercial Fishery: 20%
  - Mainstem: 845 fish
  - Select Area: 400 fish
- Sport Fishery: 80%
  - CR Estuary: 3,000 fish
  - CR Wauna-Bonneville: 1,245 fish
  - Willamette River: 745 fish (no retention fishery opened)

### 2017 Commercial Fishing Harvest

#### Mainstem

- Early Fall:
  - Catch: 485 fish
- Late Fall:
  - Catch: 235 fish

#### Select Area

- Summer:
  - Catch: 266 fish
- Fall:
  - Catch: 237 fish

### 2017 Sport Fishing Opportunities

#### <u>Estuary</u>

- June 5–14 (5 d)
- 13,700 angler trips
- Catch: 3,235 fish

#### Wauna to Bonneville

- October 21–28 (3 d)
- 10,000 angler trips
- Catch: 430 fish



### Summary of 2017 Fishing

#### Commercial Fishery

- Total Catch: 1,223 fish
  - 98% of the 2017 commercial guideline

#### **Sport Fishery**

- Total Catch: 3,665 fish
  - 86% of the 2017 harvest guideline
- 27,550 angler trips in LCR in 2017
  - Retention and catch-and-release fisheries
- 7,900 angler trips on average in 2014-2016
  - Catch-and-release only

### Public Input

- Met with Columbia River advisory groups in early January.
- Sport advisors generally supported another retention fishery.
- Commercial advisors had mixed reactions.
- Both groups were generally supportive of a conservative approach.

Adult (>65" FL)	2017: 10,400 3-yr avg.: 6,450		<ul> <li>2017 adult abundance point estimate is above desired status level.</li> <li>3-year average is not (threshold = 9,250 adults).</li> </ul>
Population Structure	~62% juvenile		<ul> <li>Continued low relative abundance of juvenile and sub-legal sized fish indicates productivity issues.</li> </ul>

### Summary

Metric	N	Interpretation	<b>Brief Summary</b>
Recruitment Index (CPN)	LCR: 1.64 WR: 1.75		<ul> <li>Significant improvement</li> <li>2017 highest YOY CPN since 2009 in LCR</li> </ul>
			<ul> <li>Highest ever for LWR</li> </ul>
LCR Fisheries (retention and catch-and-release)	27,550 (630%)		<ul> <li>Participation down from pre-closure levels</li> <li>Increased by more than 6-fold from 2016.</li> </ul>

### Next Steps

- Work with ODFW to develop another shortduration retention fishery, similar to 2017
- New policy needed for 2019
