

- Often found in rocky habitats with kelp


Natural History

- Breeding may occur anytime of year
- Feed on many invertebrates, prefer sea urchins and clams
- Home ranges are variable
- Can travel 400 km
- Possible genetic exchange with BC





- Protected under Marine Mammal Protection Act
- Federal: Washington population not listed
- Washington: endangered in 1981

- Research






