**A. Petition – WAC 220-414-070(2)(b) - Decision**

Anis Aoude, Wildlife Program Manager, briefed the Commission and requested action on a petition to change WAC 220-414-070(2)(b) to clarify the intent of a safe and ethical kill with respect to bow hunting.

Commissioner Thorburn made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Kehoe to deny the petition as presented by staff and request that the staff bring this forward during the season setting process in March/April 2019. The motion passed.

**B. Salmon Hatcheries: Conservation, Fishery Enhancement, and Prey Availability - Decision**

Commissioner McIsaac made the following motion and it was seconded by Commissioner Holzmiller:

I move that the Commission adopt the following general policy intent and guidance for the primary purpose of proposing enhanced Chinook salmon abundance for the benefit of SRKW recovery, acknowledging that there will also be secondary fishery benefits. This general policy intent is provided to Commission and Director representatives on the Southern Resident Killer Whale Task Force for guidance as they comply with the Governor requests under the Executive Order, and to the Director to include as a separate funding proposal for consideration in the Governor's proposed budget, at this point in those processes.

1. At a high policy level, the Commission proposes a significant enhancement in Chinook salmon abundance, via increases in releases from hatchery programs, approximating 50 million smolts beyond 2018 status quo releases. This is to include approximately 30 million from Puget Sound locations and approximately 20 million from Columbia River locations.
2. Table 1 below is to be used as a general reference with regard to specific areas and numbers, with the understanding that flexibility is expected from Department

- representatives as the overall policy purpose is discussed and negotiated with entities in the Task Force and budget consideration processes.
3. The Director is tasked with prioritizing what can be done in the most immediate time frame as the highest priority, with the remainder to be done as soon as possible.
  4. In all representations of this proposal in budget related discussions, it should be emphasized that this is an additional General Fund enhancement above and beyond all aspects of the status quo budget of the agency, and any substitution of the status quo budget of the agency by this enhancement proposal is opposed as a firm policy position.
  5. This proposal is in no way meant to replace, minimize, or delay ongoing or planned salmonid habitat restoration efforts.

Commissioner Thorburn made a motion to amend the motion by removing items 2, 4, 5  
Commissioner Kehoe seconded the motion, the motion passed.

The main motion, as amended, was then voted on and passed as well.

Commissioner McIsaac made a second motion, seconded by Commissioner Carpenter to:

Adopt an additional hatchery enhancement proposal in general accordance with Table 2 below, funded with General Fund funding. The proposal below is to be used as a general reference with regard to target areas and numbers, with the understanding that flexibility is expected from Department representatives as the overall policy purpose is discussed and negotiated with entities in the co-manager and budget consideration processes, with regard to efficiencies and legal constraints. In all representations of this proposal in budget related discussions, it should be emphasized that this is an additional General Fund enhancement above and beyond all aspects of the status quo budget of the agency, and any substitution of the status quo budget of the agency by this enhancement proposal is opposed as a firm policy position.

All were in favor and the motion passed.
