NEW SECTION

WAC 220-56-35000Y Clams other than razor clams – Areas and seasons.

Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-56-350, effective March 1, 2014, until further notice, is it permissible to take, dig for and possess clams, cockles, and mussels for personal use from Dosewallips State Park (only in the area defined by boundary markers and signs posted on the beach).

EMERGENCY RULE ONLY

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds:

- (x) That immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.
- () That state or federal law or federal rule or a federal deadline for state receipt of federal funds requires immediate adoption of a rule.
- () That in order to implement the requirements or reductions in appropriations enacted in any budget for fiscal years 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 or 2013 which necessitates the need for the immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the fiscal needs or requirements of the agency.

Reasons for this finding: Surveys at Dosewallips State Park indicate the clam population can support a season of the same length as last year. The earlier opening in 2014 provides a more continuous recreational clamming opportunity in the Hood Canal area, particularly with the closure of nearby Point Whitney Tidelands. There is insufficient time to adopt permanent rules.
