NEW SECTION

WAC 220-310-18000W Freshwater exceptions to statewide rules—Coastal

Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-310-180, effective August 11, 2015, until further notice the following waters are closed to all fishing:

- (1) The Newaukum River
- (2) The Newaukum River, South Fork,
- (3) The Newaukum River, North Fork,
- (4) The Newaukum River, Middle Fork,
- (5) Lucas Creek,
- (6) Mitchell Creek.

EMERGENCY RULE ONLY

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds:

- (x) That immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.
- () That state or federal law or federal rule or a federal deadline for state receipt of federal funds requires immediate adoption of a rule.
- () That in order to implement the requirements or reductions in appropriations enacted in any budget for fiscal years 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 or 2013 which necessitates the need for the immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the fiscal needs or requirements of the agency.

Reasons for this finding: Low waters are reducing the available holding habitat for spring Chinook and concentrating them into fewer and smaller pools. This in turn makes them more vulnerable to fishing pressure. Spring Chinook will be holding in the North and South forks of the Newaukum River until September when spawning begins. Increased water temperatures and higher potential encounter rates subject this fish to stress, injury, or death. There is insufficient time to adopt permanent rules. (15-246, 8/10/2015)
