WAC 220-310-19000E Freshwater exceptions to statewide rules—Puget Sound.

Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-310-190, effective September 1, 2015, until further notice, it is unlawful to violate the following provisions, provided that unless otherwise amended, all permanent rules remain in effect:

Snoqualmie River: From the mouth to Snoqualmie Falls – Closed to fishing daily from 2:00 p.m. until one hour before official sunrise.

EMERGENCY RULE ONLY

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds:

(x) That immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.

() That state or federal law or federal rule or a federal deadline for state receipt of federal funds requires immediate adoption of a rule.
