To the fine managers of the Sauk and Skagit river catch and release steelhead fishery:

Some background on me: I started fishing this system in the 70's as a kid, with my grandfather and father. My family has fished this system since the 1800's. My adult children are now the 6 generation to fish this system and the Stillaguamish system, these are our home rivers. I am writing to you to preserve one of the last wild rivers on the planet. I do not want to see it shut down; I don't want it to get abused. I want to be able to enjoy this fishery along with many generations to come. My fear, with a good portion of the state closing its waters, and when this system is the only fishery open, that it will not handle the mounting pressure and the resource will suffer. I have seen great rivers crumble, including this system, within my 52 years on this rock. The knowledge and history of this great system has been passed to me by the generations that came before. I am very passionate about this subject. I also witnessed the demise of the king salmon, here and the mighty Kenai rivers.

My **first** recommendation is that the state put a moratorium on guides on this system, including but not limited to the following.

- The most restrictive would be no guides, period.
- Limit the number of guides on the system
- Limit the number of guides and the days they may fish
- Guides that do fish this system must be registered and receive training on proper catch and release techniques to ensure the safety of the wild steelhead. They will also receive training on proper river etiquette and how to lower their impact on the watershed's ecosystem.

The Kenai River has adopted all these ideas, in some shape or form. They did this because the system was overwhelmed. As of right now, anyone can buy a guide's license, an insurance certificate, and business license and fish wherever they want without any other controls in place. There is an alarming number of guides on this river, putting their clients and other fisherman at risk, due to their inexperience at fishing and the hazards associated with the Sauk. Generations of my family have fished this system, last year was out of control. So many out of area guides, and non-guided fisherman, and its only getting worse. On every trip I would pick up a bag of other people's trash and have several negative contacts with others that had no respect for the amazing steelhead.

My second recommendation is the state open more of the Skagit River, which will spread the fishing pressure.

• Open the Skagit all the way to the HWY 9 bridge

Closing: In a perfect world, there would be many rivers open throughout the state at the same time, which would inherently spread out the pressure and give the Sauk/Skagit some relief, but that's not the case. I hope we all can get ahead of this and not chase it from behind. I feel if we (the users of the system and the managers) don't get proactive, we may lose the best species of fish ever to swim in the PNW, and or access to them.

I am willing to donate my time to this cause, if the managers feel I am an asset. I already do riverbank clean ups, boat launch maintenance, and mentor new outdoorsman. I am willing to do more if I am called to action.
