DETERMINATION OF NONSIGNIFICANCE

Name of Proposal: NORTH FORK NOOKSACK RIVER ACCLIMATION POND

Description of Proposal: This proposed acclimation pond would be component of the Nooksack Spring Chinook Recovery Plan. This has been an ongoing project since 1979 that is intended to supplement a depressed population of spring chinook on the North Fork of the Nooksack River. Currently spring chinook juveniles (originating from wild spring chinook broodstock) are being raised at the Nooksack hatchery each year and prior to release are taken to several acclimations ponds within the system in an attempt to get fish to utilize more of the river system. Genetically these fish are the same as native spring chinook in this system and the goal is to increase natural spawning through supplements from the broodstock program fish.

This acclimation pond site has been used in the past for this purpose incorporating temporary structures. This project is intended to provide a more suitable, yet portable structure with which to acclimate chinook juveniles to the water from the upper watershed. This pond will accommodate three consecutive batches of juvenile chinook a year with 133,000 fish in each batch for a total 400,000 fish. The size will be 100 fish to the pound and each batch will weigh 1300 pounds. This number of fish represents what is typically released in this area and is not an increase.

Specific components of this project includes:

- 1. Placing a 30' x 95' compacted gravel pad alongside an existing road. The pad depth will be 2 feet.
- 2. Placing a 10' x 60' fiberglass fish rearing pond on the gravel pad.
- 3. A 4" pipe will be buried from the pond up to an existing hydropower penstock, which will be the pond's source of 330 gallons per minute of water or .75 cubic feet per second.
- 4. The gravel pad will include space for a 24' travel trailer, one vehicle and one self-contained Sani-can.
- 5. Install one pole-mounted floodlight at the pond location.

The site is approximately one mile below Nooksack Falls at an existing privately owned hydropower site next to Excelsior Springs US Forest Service campground, Township 40 North, Range 8 East, SE1/4 of Section 31,Latitude 48° 54.47 N, Longitude -121° 48.96 W.
