# Purpose of checklist:

This environmental checklist asks you to describe some basic information about your proposal. Please answer each question accurately and carefully, to the best of your knowledge. You may need to consult with an agency specialist or private consultant for some questions. Retrieve errant rip rap (less than eight pieces) that fell down into stream during high flow event and reuse. Perhaps add additional rip rap (6-10 pieces) to prevent future erosion. Rock dimensions are one foot minimum by three feet maximum. Move and place rip rap with excavator on dry garvel bar. Shore up bridge abutments with gravel.
