ADDENDUM 18-033 TO FINAL SUPPLEMENTAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENTS

Dated: August 1992 and January 2002

Name of FSEIS:

- 1. Lake and Stream Rehabilitations Final Supplemental Impact Statement (FSEIS), 1992-1993 and
- 2. Lake and Stream Rehabilitation: Rotenone Use and Health Risks FSEIS, 2002

Description of Proposal:

The original FSEISs were reviewed as a statewide proposal and they apply to statewide coverage. Implementation of the FSEISs includes the following waters for the **2018** season.

This proposal includes the rehabilitation of one lake in eastern Washington managed for trout only (West Medical Lake in Spokane County). The rehabilitation treatment will be the use of rotenone to improve fishing for trout via the elimination of undesirable and/or illegally stocked fish which compete with or prey upon stocked trout fingerlings. It will also restore the economic strategy of stocking fingerling trout instead of the much more expensive and larger "catchables" which are used to temporarily "prop up" "under-performing" trout fisheries when stocking fingerlings becomes ineffective. Post-treatment, West Medical Lake will be stocked with "catchable-size" Rainbow Trout (*Oncorhynchus mykiss*) and Brown Trout (*Salmo trutta*) in March-April of 2019 to create a fishery for Opening Day of 2019. It will then be stocked with Rainbow Trout fingerlings in May-June 2019 and then Brown Trout fingerlings in October 2019 in order to create a more economically and biologically sustainable trout-only fishery. All the stocking events after that will be with fingerling-size trout.

The competing/predatory species targeted for removal in West Medical Lake this year is Goldfish *Carassius auratus*. The presence of those species is likely a result of illegal stocking.

Our program proposal this year also includes the treatment of a five mile section of Smalle Creek and a 0.7 mile section of Highline Creek, both in Pend Oreille County, by the use of Rotenone. Both projects are designed to remove nonnative Eastern Brook Trout *Salvelinus fontinalis* in order to restore populations of native Westslope Cutthroat Trout *Oncorhynchus clarki lewisi*. This would be the fourth consecutive year for the Smalle Creek project and the second consecutive year for the Highline Creek project. The current plan for Smalle Creek calls for the restocking of native Westslope Cutthroat Trout in the fall of 2018. Before that happens, ground truthing surveys in June 2018, using eDNA, will determine the presence or absence of Eastern Brook Trout in the creek. If no Eastern Brook Trout are found, no rotenone treatment will take place this year and cutthroat trout will be stocked in the fall. If Eastern Brook Trout eDNA are found, a rotenone treatment will take place this year and the restocking of native cutthroat trout will take place in 2019. We are planning for the Highline Creek project to also take three years of treatment to complete. The restocking of cutthroat into that creek is planned to occur in the fall of 2020.
