WDFW will conduct a biological assessment of Forest and Lonesome Lakes to determine existing fish presence and abundance prior to stocking tiger trout. Following the initial assessment the lake will be stocked at a rate of 50-100 tiger trout per surface acre. Agency staff, along with help from volunteer will conduct annual post tiger trout stocking assessments beginning in fall of 2019 to determine how existing fish populations respond to the stocking event. Subsequent stocking will be determined based on tiger trout survival, growth, and potential as a biological solution to illegally stocked goldfish and eastern brook trout.
